Dear District 7150 Rotarians - I am honored and humbled to serve as your 2007-08 Rotary District Governor.

With a dedicated, knowledgeable District team, and 47 club presidents, I can assure you we have capable leaders of integrity & ability. Together, we will provide a rewarding year of sharing.

The theme this year for D-7150 is "Blast Off from the Past to the Future." Where did that come from and why am I enthused?

I remember the first time I attended a Rotary meeting and emitted a silent "wow" when I realized how many professionals belonged to Rotary. The first time I attended a District event, and met Rotarians from throughout our District, that silent "wow" was a little bigger. Then came my first time attending a Zone event, and my first Rotary International Convention. The "wow's" were getting harder to keep silent.

A lot of time and effort has been invested to prepare this year's Rotary leadership to manage and lead effectively. We began our training for Governor at Zone in Boston almost two years ago, continued it at Zone in Hershey, then on to San Diego for the Rotary International Assembly.

There we met our classmates, the other 532 District Governors from 200 countries and regions around the globe, and the "Wow!" factor really kicked in.

It was at this Assembly that we heard **R. I. President Wilf Wilkinson** announce the **2007-08 Rotary theme: "Rotary Shares."**

Wilf explained that the theme suggested we reach beyond our families, our jobs and our communities to something more. He defined this as the "Magic of Rotary." Sharing our leadership, our skills, our time and our dedication to make our clubs stronger as we contribute.

President Wilkinson continued, "Rotary shares because Rotarians care. Rotary shares because Rotarians provide service above self. Rotary is about sharing. We share our time, we share our talents, we share our money with others who need help. We share our kindness and we share our love."

All of these were shared at our President Elect Multi-District Training Seminar in March, and our District Assembly in May, where our teams did an excellent job sharing their knowledge and experiences.

The four key services areas Wilf wants to emphasize are Literacy, Water Management, Health and Hunger, and the Family of Rotary.

We're going to help you make this happen. Club membership Chairs are invited to attend, with their Club President, and other interested Club members, our upcoming **District Membership & Public Relations Seminar**, being held on **Saturday, August 18th**.

R. I.'s 2007-08 Public Relations Grant

The RI Board of Directors approved the continuation of the [PR grants](#) pilot project at the district level for the 07-08 Rotary year, with *Humanity in Motion*.

The grants are designed to assist districts in spreading the word about Rotary's good works in our District and Clubs by reaching the general public via RI-produced television and

radio public service announcements, billboards, banners, and newspaper supplements throughout communities in the district.

Only one application per district will be considered. District governors will work with clubs and the district's public relations Chair to create a PR grants project plan, that represents the best PR plan for the district.

Grants of up to US\$6,000 per district will be available in 07-08. This parameter will ensure fairness and an equitable spread of Rotary promotion around the globe.

District governors must submit PR grant applications to RI headquarters by 1 October. P. R. Chair Bob Stronach will share more information at our Aug. 18th Membership & P. R. Seminar.

Team Leader Qualifications: 1.
Be a Rotarian in good standing, 2. Be
well informed about Rotary and the
communities within the District, 3.
Have an outgoing personality and
ability to speak before a group, 4. Have
ability to lead others, 5. Be able to take
four weeks away from work and family,
6. Be able to facilitate team orientation
sessions and the team while abroad.

There are no age requirements for
Team Leader other than he/she must be
able to keep pace with the rigorous
program of study planned by the
hosting district. A DG, DGE or IPDG
are not eligible. Team Leaders are not
required to have held any past District
Office but district involvement helps.

*Interviews for Team Leader will
be scheduled soon.*

Team Member Qualifications: A
team member must 1. Be a non-
Rotarian and not a blood relative of a
Rotarian, 2. Between ages 25 and 40 to
insure maximum impact on long-term
career, 3. Be a US citizen in good
health, 4. Be neat in appearance, 5. Be
articulate, able to speak before a
group, 6. Have a sound educational
professional background, 7. Be
enthusiastic about chosen vocation, 8.
Be currently employed on full time
basis in that profession for at least two
years, and 9. Be able to participate in
team orientations and take four weeks
away from work / family.

Applicants should be openminded,
tolerant, flexible, able to live within
and adopt a different culture during
exchange period, willing and able to
follow direction of Team Leader. An
essay of intent & brief resume is
required from each applicant to help
with the committee selection.

The Rotary Foundation Leadership Changes

Trustee Chair Bhichai Rattakul has announced that he will resign as chair of The Rotary Foundation Trustees on 1 August but will continue to serve as a trustee this year. "I made this difficult decision to resign as chairman because of issues related to my health and that of my wife," he said. "I deeply regret any inconvenience this unanticipated change will cause."

In keeping with the Foundation Bylaws, Trustee Vice Chair Robert S. Scott, of the Rotary Club of Cobourg, Ontario, CN, will be trustee chair from 1 Aug through 30 June 2008. A past RI vice president and director, Scott has served RI and the Foundation in many capacities, most recently on the Int'l PolioPlus Committee, which he will continue to chair.

In assuming the new leadership

role, Scott plans to continue the focus on the 2007-08 Foundation goals to eradicate polio, support Every Rotarian, Every Year initiative, show that peace is possible through support of the Rotary Centers for International Studies, and reconnect with Foundation alumni. "I worked closely with Chairman Bhichai when he developed these goals, and I strongly support all of them," Scott said.

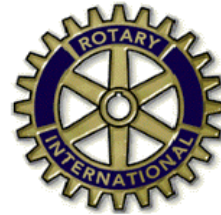
