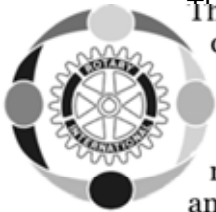
As I sign-off on this final newsletter article, The Future of District 7150 is in extraordinary Hands, "YOURS."

Rotary Fellowships

from ... The Rotary Fellowship Handbook

Rotary was founded on fellowship, a concept that has been expanded internationally through the Rotary Fellowships, groups that bring together members from different countries and cultures to enjoy a shared interest. In addition to fostering lifelong friendships, Rotary Fellowships keep members active in Rotary, sustaining their interest and further inspiring commitment.



The nearly one hundred Rotary Fellowships encompass a variety of vocations and avocations, ranging from sports and hobbies to professional interests — all of which serve as a way to extend international fellowship, friendship, and service. In addition to offering members an opportunity to share their passion for a particular interest with like-minded Rotarians, many individual fellowship groups enable members to use their hobbies or skills to serve others. For example, the Fellowship of Canoeing Rotarians has organized cleanups of polluted rivers, and members of the International Computer Users Fellowship of Rotarians conduct training sessions for Rotarians and other people in their community on how to use electronic media. Members of the International Fellowship of Rotarians with Repaired Hearts — or the “Zipper Club,” as they call themselves — have provided life-saving surgeries to disadvantaged children with severe heart defects.

Rotary Fellowships began informally in 1928 when Rotarians with a shared interest in Esperanto joined together. In

1947, a group of Rotarian boating enthusiasts began flying the Rotary flag from their crafts, calling themselves the International Yachting Fellowship of Rotarians; this fellowship now boasts the longest continuous existence. The scope of Rotary Fellowships has changed much over the years, but today their common purpose is still to unite Rotarians in friendship and provide venues for enjoying their favorite recreational or professional activities.

Rotary Fellowships Handbook
 Rotary International has established specific policies for forming a Rotary Fellowship. The RI Board of Directors evaluates and approves each new group before it receives formal recognition as a Rotary Fellowship. Each fellowship operates independently of RI, with its own rules, dues requirements, and administrative structure. Membership is open to Rotarians and, in some fellowships, to spouses and Rotaractors as well.

There are several ways to join a fellowship:

- Contact the fellowship directly. Check the RI Web site (www.rotary.org), the Official Directory, or the annually revised group directory (available online) for contact information for the chair or membership officer.
- Join online. Many fellowships operate Web sites that include interactive or downloadable application forms for potential members to complete.
- Fill out an interest coupon found in the group directory, online and, occasionally, in *The Rotarian*, and return it to RI World Headquarters. Secretariat staff will then distribute it to the relevant fellowship(s).

- Contact your district Rotary Fellowships chair. Many districts appoint Rotary Fellowships chairs to help promote and support the Rotary Fellowships program. This person will be able to help you find a fellowship that interests you.

Honored One of Their Own

Members of the Oriskany Falls Rotary Club honored one of their own on Wednesday evening, May 11 when they presented a check in the amount of \$2,400 to the Oriskany Falls Ambulance Corps and the Oriskany Falls Fire Department. The donation, which will be used to fund a new two-head radio system for the ambulance, was made in memory of *Don Cossette*, who was president of the Rotary Club when he passed away on April 11.

On hand for the program were members of Cossette's family, including Kathleen, his wife of 48 years and others. Before the ceremonies began Rotarians, as well as members of the fire department and ambulance corps, recalled many memories of Cossette who was a lifetime member and past commissioner of the department. The former mayor and trustee for the village of Oriskany Falls also served as department president from 1971-78 and again from 1986-88, was a past president of the Rotary Club, a Paul Harris Fellow, and Past District Foundation Chairman of District 7150 of Rotary International.

"We're here for a very special reason," said Rotarian Deidre Purdy. "Don was very involved in every aspect of our community."

Rotarian Nathan Keever told the group that the staff at Community Memorial Hospital remembers Cossette fondly, saying that he worked very hard at making sure no-one ever knew he was uncomfortable.

"He was a quality human being who worked hard to make people feel better," he added.

Patti Reilly summed it up by comparing her fellow Rotarian to the wheel-like center of the organization's symbol.

"Don was the hub of our Rotary Club, the fire department . . . he was the hub of the community," she said.

Ambulance Captain Linda Williams explained that Oneida County had recently become "narrow band compliant" and the donation will allow Oriskany Falls emergency crews to communicate with the 911 center as well as between vehicles and personnel and even within the ambulance itself.

"This is a wonderful addition," she said. "To see it [the ambulance and fire department] continue was one of Don's greatest passions."

We really appreciate the positive approach that many Clubs have taken, but are very concerned about those Clubs that have not taken ACTION!

SUGGESTED APPROACH TO RECRUITING NEW MEMBERS

1. Rotarians need to look for new prospects. Community and Business Leaders. Owners, Managers, Educators, Neighbors, who live or work in the Community. Consider young active Business people, as well as young Retirees who can be very active.
2. Make the contact and invite them to your Meeting. (Club give one "free lunch") Try to

get to know them. If they seem like a good candidate, INVITE them back next week, and every week..

3. Fill out a New Member Proposal Form (DO NOT ASK THEM TO SIGN YET)Give to Club President or Secretary for Board Approval.

4. Arrange a Rotary Information Meeting, with Rotarians for 30 - 40 Minutes. If they agree to join, then have them sign the Proposal. Your Club



Secretary should process it. Send out Publication to your Members. After seven days, and no objection, send Dues Notice.

5. Plan a formal Induction. Invite Spouse or Guest. Present a New Member Folder.

Eradicating polio will take RENEWED RESOLVE, says Gates

Bill Gates, cochair of the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, praised Rotary for its continued success in the effort to eradicate polio, but cautioned that Rotarians will need to redouble their efforts to keep the disease from spreading -- and threatening hundreds of thousands of children.

Gates, the keynote speaker at the third plenary session of

the 2011 RI Convention, 24 May in New Orleans, Louisiana, USA, said that because of Rotary, there are many places in the world where polio is no longer considered a threat.

"That's a blessing and a curse," said Gates. "The blessing is that in many places, polio is a disease of the past. The curse is that it is now harder for us to raise awareness that, in some places, polio is also a disease of the present. If we fail to help leaders around the world understand this, polio is certain to be a disease of the future."

Gates praised Rotary for reducing the incidence of polio by more than 99 percent worldwide since 1988.

"Your work has brought us so far," he said. "I'm so proud to be a partner in the work that Rotary has been doing to eradicate polio."

Gates noted that only one case of polio had been reported in India this year, as of March.

"India is approaching zero cases," said Gates. "None of this would have been remotely achievable had it not been for Rotary. We would not be where we are without you. Nor can we get to where we're going without you."

Gates said that he and his wife, Melinda, have made eradicating polio their foundation's top priority. With the world on the threshold of eradication, the hard work really begins, he said.

"Polio eradication has been our single biggest investment in recent years, as far as innovation and creativity. The last 1 percent will be the longest and hardest 1 percent," he said. "It will require more work and more commitment than ever before. Without the redoubled effort of everyone in this room, and your fellow Rotarians around the world, we will not

succeed. Redoubling is crucial to ending polio."

The Gates Foundation has awarded two grants totaling US\$355 million to Rotary in support of its work in eradicating the disease. Rotary has responded with Rotary's US\$200 Million Challenge. To date, Rotarians have raised \$173.2 million for the challenge.

Gates said he plans to work with Rotary leadership to keep polio front and center in the public eye. "You have helped so many people understand that we are 'this close.' I challenge you to make your voices louder."



Countries including Canada, the United Arab Emirates, the United Kingdom, and the United States have all increased their investment in the eradication effort. Gates attributed that success to the pressure Rotarians have put on the leaders of those countries. But he noted that with a funding gap of \$400 million next year for the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, it is no time to let up.

"If we fail, the disease will not stay at its current low level," he said. "It will spread back into countries where it's been eliminated, and will kill and paralyze hundreds of thousands of children who used to be safe."

Gates said that the monuments Rotarians have illuminated with the End Polio Now message are powerful images.

"But ultimately, the most important monument won't be the one we illuminate," said Gates. "It will be the one we create."

Rotary International so far has reported \$173 million dollars as of May 31, 2011 towards the \$200 million dollar challenge given us by the Bill and Malinda Gates Foundation. We need to raise \$27 million by June 30, 2012 to reach our goal. I would also like to see our District raise \$18,595 by June 30th 2011 which will put us up to the \$150,000 level.

As you can see by the figures there was an increase of polio from last month. Globally there was an increase of 64 new cases; in the endemic countries there was an increase of 14 new cases; and in the non-endemic countries there was an increase of 49 new cases, a total of 127 new cases.

Pakistan showed 40 new cases from a total of 20 cases for year ending 2010. When there was a special "sweep" operation following National Immunization Days (NIDs) following the 9-11 May they found that 5100 children were found unvaccinated. *(continued on next page)*

Both Chad and the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC) both had increases. The country of Chad has produced an updated, comprehensive emergency action plan for polio eradication, which will be presented to the Independent Monitoring Board at their meeting to be held in London from June 30 to 1 July.

DRC. Thirteen new cases were reported on April 13th. The Republic of the Congo will participate in a synchronized campaign with Angola 26-28 May. Children under five throughout the entire country will be vaccinated.

In the middle of the twentieth century, two young people wrote a "religious" song, "Let there be peace on earth", at a retreat in the San Francisco Bay Area hills. The rights to use of the song, by Rotary, were granted to Rotary International by the authors.

"Let There Be Peace on Earth."

Let There Be Peace on Earth *and let it begin with me.*

Let There Be Peace on Earth, the peace that was meant to be!

With God as our Father, brothers all are we.

Let me walk with my brother in perfect harmony.

Let peace begin with me. Let this be the moment now.

With ev'ry breath I take, let this be my solemn vow:

To take each moment and live each moment in peace eternally!

Let there be peace on earth and let it begin with me!

The song "Let There be Peace on Earth" has become a global anthem for peace. The late Jill Jackson Miller, an actress and songwriter, wrote "Let There be Peace on Earth" in the summer of 1955. Since that time the song and its message has circulated around the globe.
