From the Desk of DG Jim...

We are into the 100th anniversary year for Rotary and I thought it would be a good idea to begin this message with the words that Paul Harris used when he proposed to Silvester Schiele, Hiram Shorey and Gustavus Loehr that "they form a club different from any other, one which he described as 'a very simple plan of mutual cooperation and informal friendship such as all of us had once known in our villages.'" (*Quote from "A Century of Service: The Story of Rotary International" by David C. Forward; Page 27*) On the same page appears another quote by Paul Harris describing another one of the four founders. Gustavo H. Loehr was, "a stormy petrel, vehement, impetuous, domineering in one breath, then calm, docile, lovable in the next." Gus Loehr hosted the first official meeting at his office and then resigned after the second meeting. Lately I have often wondered what Paul Harris would say if he spoke to Rotary today. I believe he would remind us that he was seeking a club that was community based not business based. Business was for classification purposes and community mindedness was the way we should relate to each other. All four founders had good businesses but were seeking community fellowship. I believe he would remind us that, although the need for rules and regulations are essential to all organizations, they should not take a priority over "mutual cooperation" and "informal friendship." As we celebrate 100 years of service, we all need to ask ourselves if we are using Paul Harris or Gus Loehr as our Rotary role model and if the answer comes up Loehr, then what action do we need to take to get back to the heart of Rotary which was born in Paul Harris.

We have some tremendous opportunities this year to show the world and our local communities what the heart of Rotary is all about. It has often been said that "Rotary has been too often a well kept secret." If the secret doesn't get out this year then we are missing the mark. So, we can't announce we have eradicated polio, that should not stop us from letting our communities know that we are going to keep at it until it happens. Maybe our home club, district, zone or international leadership isn't all we expect it to be but if we can stand hand in hand and show both our local communities and the world that Rotarians can unclench their fist and open their hands to work across our differences and embrace together the bigger problems that face the world today, we won't have to devise any elaborate membership programs because that "best kept secret" will become the club of choice for those who want to "make a difference" by "lending a hand" as we "celebrate rotary".

Things to be looking forward to:

PETS, Centennial Bell and Birthday Celebration of Rotary (Syracuse Rotary Club), Rotary leadership Institute, Centennial Foundation Dinner, District Assembly, Resurrected RYLA, Visit from Past RI President Bhichai Rattakul (Rome Club) and Changing of the Guard are all incredible opportunities on our district's horizon in the next five months. Every one of these celebrations will include special awards and Centennial celebration surprises. I can't imagine anyone who wears the badge of Rotary not wanting to experience events that will focus on celebrating a century of serving the world and preparing for the centuries to come.

This month's look at Council on Legislations and and the MOP 2004: PLEASE READ: VERY IMPORTANT FOR

ALL PRESIDENT ELECTS: Article 9: Section 5c: Qualifications. Each officer and director shall be a member in good standing of this club. The president-elect shall attend the district presidents-elect training seminar and the district assembly unless excused by the governor-elect. If so excused, the president-elect shall send a designated club representative who shall report back to the president-elect. If the president-elect does not attend the presidents-elect training seminar and the district assembly and has not been excused by the governor-elect or, if so excused, does not send a designated club representative to such meetings, the president-elect shall not be able to serve as club president. You may then say well then we just won't have a president. Your constitution states in Article 9: section 4 that you must have a president. Does this mean you can't be the president if you miss this year's PETS? Only if you ignore the alternatives also. Every club MUST be represented or legitimately excused by the DGE. There are many alternatives if you as the President Elect can't come and besides it is a great opportunity to meet not just our district leadership team

but clubs in two other neighboring districts.

Public Relations for clubs...

Public Relations is the ability to communicate the mission and activities of your local Rotary Club to the general public. In the last issue of the Credol pointed out several reasons why the weekly Bulletin is important for each Rotary Club in District 7150. It is just as important to tell the public about the activities of the local Rotary Club. For many years, Rotary Clubs did not tell the public about the wonderful things that they were doing, in fear that it would be construed as "bragging." Telling the public about the good works that your club does for the community is not at all bragging, but a responsibility of each club. Article VII, Section 2 of your Rotary Club Bylaws list 10 committees that every Rotary Club is required to have. A Public Relations Committee is one of the ten committees. The Bylaws further state that this committee should develop and implement plans to provide the public with information about Rotary and to promote the Club's service projects and activities. There are men and women in every community that are looking for ways to help others. If they know about the good work that your Rotary Club is doing, they may choose to join you. Every Rotary Club in District 7150 could use more members, couldn't they? What kind of Club activities should be reported to the public? Your goal should be to have an article or picture in the newspapers weekly as a way of making your club more visible in the community. These items should highlight your speakers, your service projects, awards, and articles explaining the different Rotary programs. Hopefully, by educating the public on what a Rotary Club is and what it does for your community, we can gain new members who also want to serve their community.

Who should report to the public on behalf of your Rotary Club? The Bylaws call for a Public Relations Committee. A committee may consist of several members—4 or 5—one of which must have some skills in photography, computers and time to do the public relations work. The time may be no more than an hour a week. A digital picture should be taken each week at the meeting, downloaded to the computer, a caption written and emailed to the local news media.

What media will publish your public relations articles and pictures? Large daily newspapers and television stations are usually the most difficult media to work with, unless the editor or owner happens to be a member of your Rotary Club. Their space and time is very limited and expensive. Small daily newspapers, weekly newspapers and electronic newspapers are the most likely media to post your pictures and articles. Most radio stations are not locally operated anymore, so it is hard to get much news space from them. When a Rotary Club runs a major community activity, some public service announcements (PSA) may be obtained from your local radio station or cable television provider.

A good Public Relations Program is one of the easiest things that your Rotary Club can do to promote understanding of the good works that your club does. It is also a vehicle to help membership growth. - Richard Kemmis, Club Service Director

Bichai Rattakul, RI President 2002-2003 addressing over 600 Rotarians in D7150

Past RI President Bichai Rattakul took office on 1 July 2002 with a call to Rotarians to grow the organization through a renewed commitment to the four Avenues of Service — especially vocational service — and a return to the grassroots values that will empower clubs "to chart their own course, set their own goals, and fulfill their own dreams."

Rattakul is the Thailand Goodwill Representative for International Cooperation. He was a member of the Thai parliament from 1969 until he retired in November 2000 so he could become Rotary International President. During those years, he served as leader of the Democratic Party, Foreign Minister, Deputy Prime Minister, Speaker of the House of Representatives, and President of the Parliament. He also served on several commissions, Vice Chairman of the National Security Council and Chairman of the Counter Corruption Commission and the Narcotics Control Board and Honorary Vice-President of the Thai Scout Council. An accomplished diplomat, he has been awarded the highest decorations by King Bhumibol Adulyadej of Thailand, the Emperor of Japan, and the Presidents of the Philippines, Korea, Austria, and Nicaragua.

A charter member of the Rotary Club of Dhonburi, Bangkok, Thailand, since 1958, Rattakul has served RI as district governor, international assembly group discussion leader, member and chairman of numerous committees, trustee of the Rotary Foundation, director, and chairman of the Executive Committee of Rotary International. He is the recipient of The Rotary Foundation's Distinguished Service Award and Citation for Meritorious Service for his support of its international humanitarian and educational programs. Before entering government, he was president of the Thai Pharmaceuticals Manufacturing Association and Director of the Thai Chamber of Commerce and the Federation of Thai Industries. He has led many Thai delegations to the United Nations General Assembly.

Bichai as been appointed to head up the Rotary Tsunami relief effort in Thailand

During President Bichai's visit to District 7150 in November of 2002, the Polio Eradication Chairman and PDG Ed Paparella and then District Governor Don Reese presented President Rattakul with a pledge in the form of a check for the District's Polio Eradication goal. It is the goal of the Polio Eradication committee to present a certificate paid in full during Past President Rattakul's visit in June. At present, our District is short of its goal. All clubs are urged review their pledge and the amounts collected to date and make every effort to meet their goal.

The Rome Club is going to publish a commemorative booklet celebrating District 7150 highlights during the 100 years of Rotary. Rotarian, Pattie Saunders (office 337-5367, home 337-0430) of the Rome Club is the Chairman of this project and will be contacting each club. We will be asking for a one-page history of your club's highlights or whatever your club feels is appropriate for insertion in the 100-Year Anniversary booklet. Each club wishing to submit copy for the publication is asked to include a check made out to "The Rotary Club of Rome, New York" for \$100 dollars to offset the cost of production. A copy of the booklet will be given to each attendee.

Prior to dinner, Past RI President Rattakul will be presenting Paul Harris Fellowship Awards to new recipients. Clubs that want to participate must contact Carol Anthony of the Chittenango Club who is coordinating the presentations. Juliane Wentzkat-Price and Stephen Price, professional vocalists who have performed in Europe and New York City, will present a performance to enhance the 100-year celebration

The courses are designed to provide Rotary knowledge and to develop leadership skills for voluntary organizations. District Polio Eradication Campaign has 3 months remaining...

Below are the most recent figures on our District Polio Eradication Campaign progress. Again a reminder, all District 7150 Clubs and Clubs around the World are being asked to complete the Club Pledge in full by 4/30/05. If your Club is not on the list below discussion needs to take place within the Club right away to ensure your "Promise is Fulfilled" in April.

Clubs that have met or exceeded Goal: Aurora, Baldwinsville, Camden, Dolgeville, Fulton Sunrise, Greater Utica Sunrise, Marcellus, Moravia, Oneida Shores, Oswego, Oswego Sunrise, Sherrill, Skaneateles Sunrise, Solvay-Geddes, Syracuse & West Winfield.

Rotary Club Seeks Area Professionals For Goodwill Exchange To Peru

Rotarians in District 7150, Central New York, are seeking four outstanding young professional or businessmen or women to visit Peru in May 2005 as part of a Group Study Exchange of The Rotary Foundation. The purpose of a Group Study Exchange is to promote international understanding and goodwill through person-to-person contact. The awards involve a four week visit to the Lima, Peru area, during which the team members share personal knowledge of their own country and experience the customs, vocations, and lifestyles of another. While abroad, team members stay in Rotarians homes and have the opportunity to meet their professional counterparts. They also give presentations to Rotary clubs and other groups about their home country. The Rotary Foundation pays for the cost of transportation and accommodations.
