It will be appreciated.



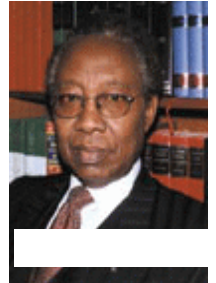

5 February 2004 **RI World Headquarters ceremony brings centennial home** - more than 200 guests, local Rotarians, and Rotary International staff looked on as RI President-elect Glenn E. Estess, Sr., Rotary Foundation Trustee Chairman James Lacy, and Evanston Mayor Lorraine Morton at precisely 1:08 pm on 2 February, unveiled the white-and-blue street banner celebrating 100 years of Rotary to clapping and the ceremonial tooting of a trumpet in front of RI World Headquarters in Evanston, Illinois, USA. Similar signs will be displayed on streets throughout downtown Evanston to announce Rotary's centennial anniversary. RI General Secretary Edwin Futa, emcee of the event expressed Rotary's gratitude for being good neighbors and hosts. He told students from Northwestern Univ, that Rotary offers a great opportunity for those who seek to work for an organization that makes a difference in people's lives. Praising the humanitarian work of Rotarians worldwide, Mayor Morton thanked Rotary for choosing Evanston as its home. "Raise the banner high," she said.

To participate in the program, clubs must register their Centennial Community Project with their District Chair (*which all of our D7150 Clubs did*), and then registered online at the R. I. website [http://www.rotary.org/centennial/cent\\_proj.html](http://www.rotary.org/centennial/cent_proj.html)

All projects must be completed by Feb 2005, Rotary Centennial month.

Projects that meet the criteria will appear in a special photo display at the 2005 RI Convention. Sponsoring

clubs will receive special recognition. Some projects will be featured in RI publications and on the RI Web site.

### *Rotary Centennial Poster Contest*

District 7150 is proud to enter the poster submitted by the Fulton Rotary Club in the contest. We'll keep you posted. Congratulations to the Fulton Club on going the extra mile.

### *Rotary Centennial Bell Journey*

You can find a Club on the R.I. website. All twin club relationships must be reported to R I by 1 Dec.2004, either by completing a down loadable Twin Club Report Form and sending it to RI, or through the online application in the Member Access section of RI Website. To report using the online application, a club must register online first.

**MOST IMPORTANT To-Do: make sure someone in your club submits your project to R.I. via their website.**

## Rotarians Advised to Delete Scam Emails by Marlene B. Brown



The Rotary world is not immune to **e-mail scams**, which come in many guises but have the common goal of bilking money from Rotarians worldwide. Offers to transfer money into a special account are among the most typical cases. A

recent e-mail scam uses Rotary's current theme as a plea for personal gain via "investment opportunities". Rotarians who have received this and similar messages are advised to delete them immediately. If you believe you have been a victim of an Internet scam, refer to following web resources:

Internet Fraud Complaint Center (IFCC) where you can file complaints. The Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) website describes common fraud schemes.

**Best advice**, when in doubt, delete emails from people you do not know, and do not open attachments or emails from people you don't know.

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## D7150 Youth Exchange Program Wins USA/Canada Award, by Scott Wisner

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It gives me great pleasure to announce that at the USA/Canada Youth Exchange Conference banquet, **Rotary D7150 Youth Exchange program** was awarded the “**Outstanding District Youth Exchange Program**” award for 2004, an award given annually to the District Youth Exchange program that has distinguished itself for the quality of its program.

Of more than 160 district youth exchange programs in North America, roughly 1/3 of the total number of districts in the world, District 7150 was singled out for our program, not just based on the number of students we send and receive but for our innovations (the Rotary Mentor program was our innovation), the quality of the organization from the recruiting programs to the interview process to orientations, to the involvement of Rotex in our program and our contributions to other district

programs (our materials are used all over the US & Canada for orientations, handbooks and other resources). It is a high honor that you all can be proud to have contributed to.

Bill and I were very proud to have had the chance to accept the award on behalf of our program here in District 7150. Al Kalter was sitting with us at the banquet and was very proud to have helped us to this honor. He said he felt like a proud grandfather. It was a wonderful evening for our program and one I will not forget.

*As you can imagine, we are now on everyone's radar.* While this honor gives us the recognition for our program, the pressure is on us to not only reprove this but to keep moving forward further improving our program. Our kids will be looked at more closely by others. It means we have a successful program, something we all knew. *Now we have to be*

We saw pictures of the Ropes Course they use to engender teamwork, were made to feel very welcome and were impressed by the quality of the staff and facilities.

Two individual students gave us their impressions of SUNYIT. One of the most significant elements I picked up was that the Int’l Students are mixed in with the other students providing interaction.

Each fall, the students celebrate, with the rest of the students, their national holidays, etc. They wear national costumes, perform and teach national dances, with everyone having a great time.

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## Paul Harris to be Honored in U.S. Capital

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Rotary founder Paul Harris is among more than 70 outstanding U.S. volunteers who will be *honored through a new national memorial in Washington, D.C.*, located on a one-mile path adjacent to the White House and U.S. Treasury Department.

When completed, “The *Extra Mile*” Volunteer Pathway will feature bronze medallions with a likeness of each honoree, a description of his or her achievements, and/

or a quotation. Each of the medallions will measure 42 inches (more than 1 meter) in diameter. Dedication is planned for mid-2004.

The *RI Board of Directors approved a project* to facilitate the construction of the Paul Harris medallion, which will be placed in a block of granite set into the sidewalk. An effort is under way to raise US\$50,000 toward the cost.

“More than 1.7 million visitors are expected to see the Pathway each year and the medallion will remain there in perpetuity, creating

a wonderful public relations opportunity for Rotary International,” according to RI VP Frank Collins Jr. and PDG Jack B. Blane, co-chairs of the project.

*The Points of Light Foundation*, the program initiator, believes the memorial will promote the spirit of volunteerism among visitors who walk the pathway. **Contributions** toward the special tribute to Paul Harris may be made by check only to Points of Light Foundation, c/o PDG Jack B. 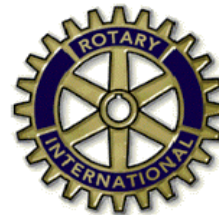
