It shows the club has met the standards of success, as determined by Int'l President Bhichai Rattakul. I am pleased to announce that 18 of the 45 clubs have earned this award. I have certified the applications and they have been sent to RI for processing.

President Bhichai determined the clubs should have direct input into their own goals and objectives. As a result, he set up the following **criteria / guidelines** for meeting the Presidential Award. **First**, a club set their own membership goals for 02-03, then met them. 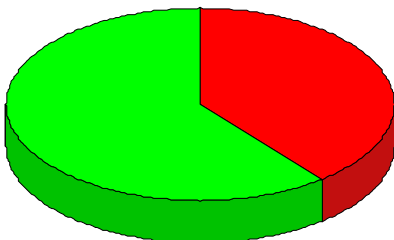

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## More Than Simply the Gift of Vision by Chair Jim Gascon

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I had a rather interesting and thought-provoking Sunday morning this past weekend. It was *time to take our Gift of Vision child Manuel* and his mother Rosa to the airport.

I arose at 5:00am and arrived at the Ronald McDonald House at 6:00am. Rosa and Manuel were all packed and waiting. Night Manager Jennifer Garrison was with them. Rosa and Manuel had arrived with two suitcases and were leaving with six. They were both wearing new shoes and clothing, all given by anonymous donors. Rosa was wearing a new hair style donated by a local salon. Manuel had a brand new coat that the ladies from the Ronald McDonald House claim “they just found in a closet in the house”. Rosa, who was stoic and reserved when she arrived, greeted me with a big smile.

She said something I did not understand in Spanish and gave a big bear hug to both Jennifer and I. She was crying and obviously trying to deal with the competing emotions within her of the delight over returning home to her 11 children, happiness that Manuel’s surgery went so well, and sadness that she was leaving her new friends. She came to love the ladies at the Ronald McDonald House. She was amazed by the unconditional affection she received from the Rotarians.

Manuel, who had not smiled for the first few days of his visit with us, had made a similar metamorphosis. After packing the car, he leaped into Jennifer’s arms and gave her a hug and a kiss, wrapping his legs around her waist. Was this the same child that had arrived four weeks ago? Obviously not.

We arrived at the Buffalo

Airport at 8:30 a.m. and were greeted by a blurry-eyed technician from the CNY Eye Bank. You see, Dr. Norton and the Eye Bank Director Susan Sullivan had made last minute arrangements for Rosa and Manuel to carry a cornea back with them for another of Dr. Salina’s patients. The technician looked exhausted. He told me he had been up all night.

Before entering airport security, we were stopped by airline officials. They refused to permit the cornea on the plane without proper documentation. They explained you cannot transport human tissue on an airplane without obtaining proper clearance from the airline management. I knew they were right. I told them, however, as I handed the container over to them that “they better be absolutely correct about their interpretation of airline rules because there will be a patient in Mexico who is not going to receive the cornea they need.” After clearing security, we rushed to the gate for final boarding.

Upon arriving at the gate, we were told the airline had held the plane for us. I looked over my shoulder and saw the airline manager running through the terminal towards us with the cornea container in his hand. Through heavy breathing he told us he “pulled some strings” and was permitting us to carry the corneas on the plane. I suspected the strings he had pulled did not extend beyond his own heart. We hastily said our good byes and Rosa and Manuel rushed to the plane.

On my ride home I turned the radio on and listened to updates on the war in Iraq. I could not help but reflect and compare upon the events that took place over the past three weeks. Our nation went to war. A child and his mother had come to us from a far away land to receive our

help. Americans on both sides of the war issue had expressed their concerns and opinions. I thought no matter which side our fellow Americans were on, either for or against the war, all held their own belief because they felt it was best for the people of our country, best for the people of Iraq, and best for the world.

I was proud of the Americans who had fought and died for their country and for the freedom of strangers in a land far away. I was proud of the Rotarians in Central New York who gave so much of their time and money for Rosa and Manuel. I was proud of Dr. Norton, the CNY Eye Bank and the ladies at the Ronald McDonald House. I was proud of the anonymous donors who purchased four suitcases full of clothes, shoes and gifts for Rosa and Manuel. I was proud of the blurry-eyed technician who had harvested a cornea in the early morning hours and stayed up all night so that a stranger in a distant land could receive the Gift of Vision ... and I was proud of the airline manager who in a momentary decision decided to “pull a few strings”.

On my ride home I concluded that there are no people on earth more generous than Americans...and I concluded that *this project is about more than simply the Gift of Vision.*

*Afghanistan is Rotary's 166th country* The Rotary Club of Kabul, Afghanistan, was welcomed back into Rotary International, ending a 24-year absence of Rotary in that country and raising the total number of countries in which Rotary clubs are active to 166. The club had previously existed from 1968 to 1979, but more than two decades of war and political instability made it impossible for it to remain active. This addition marks another milestone in Rotary's expansion into Muslim countries. The United Arab Emirates was the most recent predominantly Muslim country to join Rotary's family when the Rotary Club of Dubai was chartered last year. Boasting 41 charter members, the newly formed club will be a part of D3270 with Pakistan. RI President Bhichai Rattakul was instrumental in facilitating the work of the Rotary Club of Hayward Sunset, California, USA, which is comprised almost entirely of Afghan immigrants, to sponsor the provisional club along with the Rotary Club of Uni Town Peshawar, North West Frontier Province, Pakistan.

**Nat'l Cyber Security Day**, Apr 6th, is a good time to defend your computer. The **latest scam artist hits** are new threats with variations

on old themes, i.e. e-mails relying on "social engineering", the computer term for trickery. It is patterned on the old Nigerian 419 scam. Perpetrators lure their victims with the promise of easy

money. Ex: the son of an Iraqi businessman seeks help, saying his father has been murdered by the government and he needs help getting \$120 million out of the country (these vast sums don't exist). The person who helps can expect to make \$20 million. In these schemes, victims are asked to open a bank account and wait for the riches to flow. First, victims get requests for money to pay

fees and bribes. It continues until the victims wise up or are drained. An e-mail supposedly from President Bush is also circulating. It requests money for military and post-war operations in Iraq. People have lost hundreds of millions of dollars in e-mail scams. Don't fall for them. Now is the time to **also watch out for dangerous downloads.** Don't open attachments from unknown persons.

With the Polio Campaign running over a 3-year period and often a change yearly in Club responsibilities, the importance of well-documented records must be a priority. If the Polio Campaign information is passed to a different person each year, it is strongly recommended, the Club Leadership review the information in detail before this responsibility is assigned to another member. With over 30,000 Rotary Clubs in the World each Club must ensure details of the Polio Campaign Commitment & Payments by member are accurately documented and held in a safe, secure place.

We are only a couple months away from announcing to the World we have met our Polio Eradication Global Goal. As the clock ticks the excitement mounts for all of us. Please know all the Clubs & individual members here in District 7150 have

stepped up to do their part in making this campaign a success. Thank you again for your generosity in making our District 1 of 4 in the Rotary World with 100% Club participation in the Polio Eradication Campaign. That is something, with 530 Districts in the world, to be shared with pride with all our membership. Fulfilling our Promise Eradicate Polio has been D7150's motivation & united voice.

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Yes, it's time to talk about the **District Assembly**, which occurs on **Saturday, May 17<sup>th</sup>** at the **Airport Inn at Oneida County Airport**, 5920 Airport Road, Oriskany, NY.

**Registration** will open at 8:00am, with a continental breakfast provided. After a presentation to the group, there will be breakout sessions for members and training programs for club officers, a luncheon, a smorgasbord of presentations about Rotary projects, an address, a prize bestowed, a 50/50 and adjournment at 2:30 PM.

I have attended two other districts' Assemblies in the last few weeks. I went to Skidmore College in Saratoga Springs to check out the District Assembly for 7190, and this weekend I went to Vestal for the 7170 Assembly. Frankly, I went there to check out their formats, and plagiarize new ideas. I found them both informative and beneficial and I came away from them with some fresh approaches & new perspectives.

***There is a common denominator***, though, that we should keep in mind. The purpose of the District Assembly, is to **Assemble as a District!** Brilliant, right! ***As an official district meeting, we will consider the 2003-04 Budget***, review any resolutions presented by the Resolutions Committee, and be introduced to the Rotary International 2003-04 theme, logo, and areas of focus. There will be a special training session for Presidents-elect, a session just for Club Secretaries, one just for Club Treasurers, Foundation and Membership breakouts of benefit to Club Foundation Chairs and

Club Membership Chairs, and a special Youth Exchange Officer training program put on by members of the Youth Exchange Committee.

So, should just club officers attend? Isn't it the responsibility of every Rotarian to learn as much as they can about Rotary? Don't we know that Rotary is constantly changing and evolving to make itself more effective in delivering service? **Every Rotarian in District 7150 can come away from District Assembly with a renewed Rotary spirit, and information they can share with others.** It's an opportunity to get "Rotarized" and re-energized.

***We are fortunate to have PDG Michael McGovern*** from Maine, District 7780. Mike will be presenting a breakout on Fund Development for The Rotary Foundation. In plain English, he will be suggesting ways for clubs to raise funds for the Foundation, and offering "how-to" advice based on his experience in his district and in his capacity as a Zone 32 Regional Rotary Foundation Committee member. Incoming District Foundation Chair Donna Schonewetter of the Rome Rotary Club will be presenting a breakout session that is an overview of the D7150 goals and plans for the 2003-04 year.

***There will be breakouts*** about Literacy, Public Relations and the Youth Exchange Program/Rotary Youth Leadership Award (RYLA) Program. To me, though, the most exciting offering is "Rotary 101." Any District 7150 Rotarian who joined Rotary since May 18, 2002 may attend the District Assembly

and their registration fee will be waived. This will be like a buffet of Rotary appetizers. It will introduce the new Rotarian to many of the Rotary programs and projects, but in small, bite-size pieces.

***In addition to a real lunch buffet, there will be a speakers' buffet*** of mini-programs presented during the meal. Topics include the Rotary International Centennial, the Team/Fellowship Model, a Group Study Exchange to South Africa, Dollars for Scholars, Make-a-Difference Day, the Ambassadorial Scholar program, and the District Conference in Chautauqua October 24-26. The winner of the free Conference Weekend will be drawn then.

**We will also be hearing from** Tom Slater, Executive Director of the CNY Food Bank, who will talk about "Striving Against Hunger", America's "Second Harvest." Registration forms are being mailed to all Presidents, Presidents-elect, and Club Secretaries.

It was wonderful to meet the RI rep from Ghana and to experience so much warmth and fellowship at the conference. The people of Taiwan really know how to enjoy themselves.
