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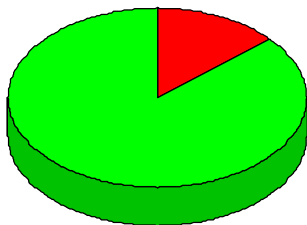

It hardly seems possible that nearly one year ago I was writing my first article for Credo as Governor of District 7150. In that article, I outlined the District goals for 2002-2003, and asked for everyone's support and guidance. *I am very pleased and proud to report* that as a District, and as a team, we had an outstanding year, while we certainly did..."Sow The Seeds of Love".

Our fifteen District goals were certainly ambitious and challenging. We were able to accomplish some and get started on others. We have set the path and established many positive things...one seed of love at a time!

First, I wanted everyone to have fun! Rotary is all volunteers. If you cannot have fun in a volunteer organization, then we all have some more work to do. Check out some of the great clubs we have, they know how to have fun! Chittenango, Morrisville, Waterville, GUS, and many others... great meetings with a tremendous amount of enthusiasm.

In the form of cash or pledges, raise at least \$300,000 for the *Eradicate Polio Campaign*. I am pleased to report that we have raised nearly \$330,000 and will most likely exceed that by 2005! What a job! PDG Ed Paparella and Committee will continue hard at work to make this possible.

We wanted a 100% club representation at the *District Conference*...we had 42 of the 45 clubs present. Thanks!

We wanted to add three *new clubs* in 2002-2003. We were able to com-

plete the Charter process for our newest club, the Rotary Club of Syracuse Inner City. PDG Ward told me that we now have the required 20 new members for the Skaneateles Sunrise Club as well. In addition, Credo Editor and NH PP Marlene Brown is getting the ball rolling for one of the first "cyber" clubs in the Rotary world!

We wanted to have all 45 clubs earn the *Presidential Citation*. While we did not accomplish that, we did have 23 clubs do so, thus making us a Presidential Citation District. We need to continue to work on the membership goals... that was our largest barrier.

Again, our team wanted to have 100% of the clubs represented when *President Bhichai* Rattakul made his *visit*. We had an impressive 43 clubs present, with one club going to Rochester to see him. 44 clubs...not bad! What a great night that was! Many thanks to the Rome Rotary Club for making all of that happen.

We were able to have a successful *RYLA* program, with many thanks to Ray Allen for his tireless efforts to make this happen. We added an Interact Club in Fulton as well.

We wanted to *increase our membership* by a challenging 145 members. While the latest figures are still being tabulated, it seems that we were able to hold our own, but have gained few, if any members. Quality is important and I appreciate the high retention rates. Best wishes for future growth.

I watched a movie the other day called Pay It Forward. I won't spoil the movie for anyone who hasn't seen it, but there's a scene at the end where a crowd of people gather in one place trying to show support for Helen Hunt's character. As the film ends you see more people coming to do the same thing. I was struck that this must be what people around the world see when Rotary goes to help.

A month ago, I had a chance to see Bhichai Rattakul speak in Rome, New York. This man amazed me with his views. He asked that we not treat him any differently than any other Rotarian, just because he has the title of Rotary International President. I enjoyed his humor and his words

very much.

But *on the same program was a woman from South American*, who spoke no English. I think her short speech, which was translated for us, was even more moving. This is why I mentioned the movie. She was the mother of a little boy who was getting progressively weaker as the days went on. She was told that her son was going to die because she couldn't afford the procedure to save his life. To parents, this has to be one of the worst things they could ever hear of have to watch. Fortunately, one day a complete stranger, who her family had never met before, came to them and said, *"I'm a member of an organization that is close to 1.3 million members strong, and*

we want to help you." Rotary brought this woman and her son to the U.S., saw that the operation was performed and that her boy was made whole again. This woman stood before a room full of Rotarians and stated she would never be able to say "Thank you" enough or properly express how much we had given her by letting her child have hope of a bright future.

As I sat there, I felt a lump grow in my throat and my eyesight began to blur a little. I guess I realized that all the chicken barbecues, raffles, and other fundraisers I've done with my club actually do make a difference in someone's life.

Remember that **no matter what you do as a Rotarian, it does matter to someone, somewhere.**

Internet Fraud Complaint Center by Marlene Brown, D7150 Internet Communications Officer



While the Internet abounds with useful information, it is also riddled with fraudulent schemes. E-mail is one of the most abused means by which perpetrators contact victims. Offers of opportunities to transfer money into a special account are

among the most typical cases. The Internet Fraud Complaint Center reports that e-mail and Web page fraud account for a total dollar loss of about US\$17.8 million. Some Rotarians have expressed concern about the privacy of their contact information. Rotary International would like to assure all

Rotarians that their private information, including e-mail addresses, is secure. RI goes to great lengths to ensure the security of personal data and does not publish or divulge e-mail addresses or any other information to third parties. \$ 88,557,000 Raised by Rotarians Worldwide for Polio Eradication by PDG Ed Paparella

We Helped Make It Happen - Congratulations one and all. By now you are aware the worldwide Polio Eradication Campaign goal of **\$80 million has been far exceeded.** On June 3rd in Brisbane, at the International Convention it was announced over \$ 88 million was raised in pledges, cash and District Designated Funds. An outstanding performance by Rotarians all over the world united in the greatest Humanitarian effort of all time.

Our District set a goal of \$300,000 and eventually exceeded that goal by \$30,000. All 45 Clubs in our District stepped up, as they have so often in the past. It just does not get any better.

From all of us on the District Polio Eradication Team, a very sincere Thank You for all your support and staying with the task throughout this Rotary year.

Current donations to the Polio Eradication Campaign from our District are in excess of \$100,000. This puts us nearly one-third of the way toward our \$330,000, 3-year commitment.

Just a reminder that you ***ensure*** your Club Polio Eradication Records are kept up to date and ***your goal is achieved.***

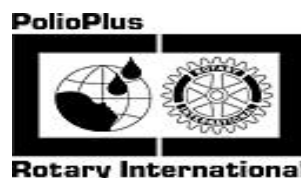

*I returned from Brisbane, Australia a few days ago, and I have been trying to put my impressions and experiences into perspective to share with the District 7150 Rotarians in Credo. I was reminded of something I heard said last fall at the Governor-Elect Training Seminar (GETS) in Williamsburg, Virginia. I was part of a workshop titled Membership: Issues of Retention, Recruitment, & Education, and one panelist was Past Rotary International President Chuck Keller (1988-89). When it became his turn to address the group, he talked about the "Education" portion of the program, and he started with a personal observation about **becoming a Rotarian "in his heart."***

He stated he first felt he had fully embraced Rotary when he attended his first Int'l Convention. PRIP Chuck said he was **overwhelmed by the "internationality" of Rotary**, beyond anything he had ever experienced before. We all nodded in agreement, but I don't think we were able to share his feelings at that time. I had been to the 92nd Rotary International Conference in San Antonio, TX and it had been a revelation for me, but I can't say I had the same response. This time PRIP Chuck's comments were right on target. **Being in another nation, seeing so many cultural differences, and meeting international friends** from Anaheim, I, too, was struck by the overwhelming "internationality" of Rotary, and all that it means. It was wonderful to see my friends DGE Ken from Florida, DGE Les

from England, DGE Kawal from the Punjab, India and others. **We shared our plans & hopes**, and spent some "down time" together. In addition to addresses by RI President Bichai Rattakul and RI President-Elect Jonathan Magiyagbe, **we were honored to hear** from the former Prime Minister of Thailand, three Peace Scholars, Foundation Chairman PRIP Glen Kinross, and an amazing collection of distinguished speakers. Two new clubs were chartered in two new countries: Rotary Club of Dili, Timor-Leste and Rotary Club of Kabul, Afghanistan. (Afghanistan had Rotary clubs prior to the Taliban's rule, but they had been disbanded. The new president of the Kabul club is Karima Farani, a woman.)

The House of Friendship featured **programs and projects from every continent**, offering opportunities for service and support that we only scratch the surface of at the district level. Programs such as Rotoplast, Dentaplast, Friendship Exchange, Rotary Fellowship, and topics from water purification to child spacing projects were presented for sharing seeking partners.

We often speak of the "International flavor" of Rotary, and point out that this attribute is what sets us apart from other service organizations. We are truly International at the core and we have been very successful in the world arena. The announcement that Rotary had achieved and surpassed its goal for Polio Eradication Fundraising was a high point of the 94th Convention, and **brought the entire audience to its feet**, with a thunderous and lengthy applause. Over 15,000 Rotarians and their families at-

tended, representing 113 countries and 3908 clubs, so **I was in very good, international company**. When it comes to "flavor" then, I think I'll pass on the vanilla, and go for something with more variety, diversity, and a greater impact—**I choose Rotary and I encourage you to do the same**. Look into attending the 95th Rotary International Convention in Osaka, Japan. **It could change your life, and you might never go back to vanilla again!**

Changes Coming to Monthly Attendance Report

Rotary Int'l requires each district to file a report monthly that asks for the number of new members and number of members terminated each month.

Starting July 2003 **the Monthly Attendance Report** will allow clubs to report new members and terminations instead of just a total figure. The new form will also give us info R.I. needs to further their membership initiatives.

In addition, we will be making changes to the Club Honor Roll. Going forward, special mention will go to clubs for leading the district in the following areas:

1. Highest % of attendance
2. Most number of new mem-

bers in new Rotary year (July 1)

3. The highest net gain in total members since July 1.

4. The highest percentage (net) since July 1.

This will allow clubs who actively recruit new members to have a chance in the limelight, while still tracking those clubs with the best overall performance.

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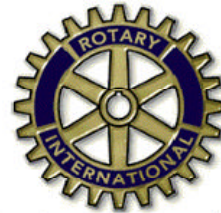
