It seems like it was yesterday when we just kicked off our Global & District Polio Eradication Campaign, when in reality around 16 months have passed. In the June Credo you read about our World and District successes, \$88.5 million pledged worldwide and \$330,000 pledged from our District. It is amazing to see the results when Rotarians take on the responsibility to do battle with these deadly and crippling diseases.

Polio was a threat to our work 40+ years ago. With the vision and determination of a handful of Rotary Leaders, some 20 years ago, the task of Polio Eradication once and for all became the drumbeat heard around the world.

We are so very close in winning this battle and with continued focus and support from the 30,000+ Rotary Clubs behind this effort, we are confident we can finish the job. *Thank you District 7150 Rotarians for all you have done and for all you will continue to do.*

As we start a new Rotary Year, please stay focused on your Club Polio Campaign goal and ensure the pledges continue to come in and are documented and forwarded to the Foundation Office on a regular basis. When the Foundation reports are received please review them carefully to ensure proper credit has been given as instructed. With pledges coming in from all over the Rotary world in great numbers, on occasion, entries are processed incorrectly. It is up to each Club to take on this responsibility to verify that proper credit is given to the individual and the Club.

To support the Clubs we have again put together a District Polio Eradication Campaign Team. Using the Assistant Governor model in assigning responsibilities

we are making available a person in each of the 8 Areas, who will interface with the Clubs as we move into our 2<sup>nd</sup> year in the Polio Eradication Campaign.

These individuals are available to assist & support you with ideas and answers to your questions regarding our Polio Eradication initiative. The District Polio Campaign Club Coordinators for 2003-04 are: Area 1 Jim Throneberry, Little Falls Club; Area 2 Don St. Louis, Utica Club; Area 3 Joe Bearman, Oneida Club; Area 4 Andy Zaplatynsky, Syracuse Sunrise Club; Area 5 Jim Austin, DGE, Tully Club; Area 6 Judy Young, Fulton Club; Area 7 Mike Occhipinti, PDG, Rome Club; Area 8 Marvin Reed, Oneida Shores Club. *A warm Welcome to the New Committee Members.*

In the first year of the Campaign 37 of our 48 Clubs have submitted campaign contributions of \$117,587 toward our \$330,000 3-year commitment. An outstanding response from all of you. ***Thank you for once again leading the way and showing the world how truly committed we are in "Fulfilling Our Promise" to Eradicate Polio in the World.***

**The following article appeared in The Oneida Daily Dispatch.**

"It came on like the flu, but was far more calamitous. It struck hard at any age, but most of its victims were children under three. It caused paralysis, almost always permanent, and a child struggling in leg braces was a sure sign of the disease. It withered arm and leg muscles but its cruelest form attacked a victim's respiratory system, causing suffocation. During the 1940s and 1950s, the fearsome disease routinely swept the United States in summer causing widespread panic. The years 1953 and 1954 were epidemic years. Vac-

cines developed by Jonas Salk and Albert Sabin finally drove polio from the U.S. in the 1960s, but not before it crippled thousands of children. On Sept. 6 and 7, an iron lung will be on display at Cottage Lawn Craft Days as part of the Rotary Club of Oneida's presentation on the polio eradication project. Polio victims were placed in iron lungs, huge space age-like metal cylinders designed to keep them breathing. There they remained until they either died or could breathe on their own. The devices had to be operated manually if power failed. Some never left the device.

An iron lung was located at the Upstate Medical University in Syracuse, where it was restored to working order. The university loaned the device to Rotary Clubs to display throughout the state for the next three years. Polio is spread by saliva, body fluids, and water. The iron lung displayed was constructed for child polio victims and weighs about 1,000 lbs. 'It's a symbol of what polio victims had to go through,' said Mickey Moore, chairperson of the National Rotary Foundation's Polio Eradication Committee. 'It's how they kept alive.' In 1984, Rotary International, an organization with 1.2 million members worldwide, joined forces with the World Health Organization and United Nations to eradicate polio world-wide. Far East Asia, North & South America, Europe and Australia today are free of the disease but the disease still ravages six countries, Pakistan, India, Afghanistan, Nigeria, Niger and Somalia. Rotary International's goal is to raise \$80 million for the polio eradication project".



The D7150 **2003-04 Group Study Exchange with District 9270 in South Africa** will be a special focus exchange. Candidates must be involved in Literacy and/or Education with the focus of the exchange being on promoting Adult Functional Literacy. District 9270 has approximately 48 Rotary Clubs. Their GSE Team will travel visit our district from Sept 27 to Nov 1, 2003. They will attend our Chautauqua, NY, conference. Our team will travel to D9270 from April 3 to May 10, 2004.

***District 9270 KwaZulu-Natal South Africa GSE visit to District 7150 Upper New York USA***

Leading the South Africa Team will be Elizabeth (Beth) Mills de Bruin (pronounced "duh Brain")

Her Vocation is an Education Specialist, dealing with the psychological, social and educational needs of learners in public schools. Her home language is English. She is married to Hennie de Bruin and has 5 children. Beth says "I would particularly like to visit Literacy Projects which have a strong community base; educational institutions dealing with learners with Special Needs; and schools which have well established Inclusive Education programmes. I have a very broad interest in education, the development of Learner Support Materials and Life-long Learning programs".

*Team Member Mbali Ngcobo* says, "I was born 37 years ago in Pietermaritzburg, South Africa. I'm a single lady and have a 6-year-old son who goes to a pre-school. My home language is Zulu and English is my second language. I'm currently working as a trainer for a provincial conservation body called KwaZulu – Natal Wildlife.

Vocational Activities I'd like to undertake during the exchange are: ABET programmes, conservation bodies/nature reserves and parks, training providers and training departments".

*Team Member Rishidevi Naidoo* aka Nishi says, "I am married to Steven and have two wonderful daughters. I work at the Umzinto Correctional centre where I head the Education and Training centre. I am committed to the upliftment of literacy in my province and my country. I am also the chairlady of the KwaZulu Natal Department of Correctional Services Abet Committee. With the above in mind I would like to visit some correctional centres on my tour abroad".

*Team member Mary-Joe Emde* says "I am a mother of three boys - ages 4, 9 and 11. My husband and I work from home. I am an independent skills consultant assisting small, medium and micro business with developing their skills in the financial services sector. A trained Psychologist, I am part of the South Africa education system transformation. During this trip I would like to visit institutions that focus on financial literacy and also like to see how education is delivered in America".

*Team Member Jeffrey Mkhize*, (Surname is Mkhize, and first names are Jeffrey Siphwe), was born in 1968. His home language is IsiZulu, with additional language of English. Married with two girls and one boy, his Vocation is that of a Teacher in Correctional Services / Prison. He says "I would like to visit prisons in the District, especially Juvenile Centres and Women Holding Facilities. I would also like to visit Adult Education Centers when possible". ***Complete team bios & pictures are on our district website***

Chair Townsend reports "The District 7150 GSE committee is proud to report that they have chosen PDG Ward Vuillemot as Team Leader for our GSE team that will be going to South Africa this coming spring. We invite all Rotarians to urge qualified professionals they know to apply for the positions of team members."

**Team Member Qualifications:** A team member must 1. Be employed in adult Literacy and/or Education vocation, 2. Be nonRotarian and not a blood relative of a Rotarian, 3. Between ages 25 and 40 to insure maximum impact on long-term career, 4. Be a US citizen in good health, 5. Be neat in appearance, 6. Be articulate, able to speak before a group, 7. Have a sound educational professional background, 8. Be enthusiastic about chosen vocation, 9. Be currently employed on full time basis in that profession for at least two years, 10. Be able to participate in team orientations and take four weeks away from work / family.

Applicants should be openminded, tolerant, flexible, able to live within and adopt a different culture during exchange period, willing and able to follow direction of Team Leader. An essay of intent is required from each applicant. A brief resume would also be helpful to the selection committee.

### **Rotary Foundation Update - by Donna Schonewetter, 03-04 Chair & JGortner, 02-03 Chair**

2002-03 Foundation Chair Jerry Gortner, DGN, reports that Actual Polio Eradication dollars submitted during the first year of our three year campaign were \$115,462.42. Contributions to the Annual Fund decreased to \$58,357, short of our \$68,000 goal. June contributions to the Annual Fund were fantastic with over \$18,000 received.

Thanks to you our District will control \$35,000 during our 2005-06 Rotary year for community service & approved foundation programs. Our total giving per Rotarian reached \$116.89 in 2002-03. Restricted contributions equaled \$1,450 and contributions to the Permanent Fund totaled \$9,535.25.

A special Thank You to our Foundation Fund raising Chairs for 2002-03: Ed Paparella, PDG - Polio Eradication; Ward Vuillemot, PDG - Annual Funds; Hal Brown - Permanent Fund; David Peterson, PDG - Benefactor.

Foundation Annual Fund Motto going forward: "Every Rotarian \$100 Every Year" Clubs achieving will receive a "Recognition Banner" for display and presentation by District Governor Andrea.

2003-04 Foundation Chair Donna Schonewetter reports that D7150 Rotarians must remember, as we embark upon a new Rotary year, the importance of our ongoing efforts to support contributions to *The Rotary Foundation* (TRF). Last year our overall contributions exceeded \$180,000. A large portion of this total was due to the outstanding efforts to raise funds of over \$110,000 to eradicate polio, a great start to fulfill our 3-year pledge commitment of \$330,000.

*During 2003-2004*, DG Andrea has set a Foundation giving goal of \$125,000 which is in addition to the pledges previously made for polio. We need to complete the polio eradication promises, but we cannot do so at the expense of neglecting our responsibilities to annual, designated, and permanent fund giving needs. We need to keep all aspects of TRF in perspective.

As part of your financial planning, keep this in mind and include an individual club budget line item for giving to the Foundation this year. Our Committee is planning *district-wide fundraisers* to raise money to assist us in reaching the goal.

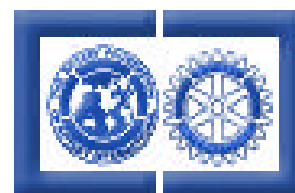

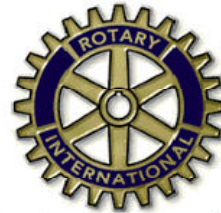
