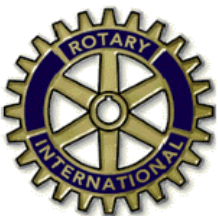

"Service Above Self"

In one of his poignant addresses, International Rotary President Rick King asks, *"Who touched you?"* This is a relevant question to all Rotarians, for it focuses on the prime reason we are committed to Rotary. President Rick explains who touched him and how it changed his life.

Many of us in Rotary have had similar situations. Mine came when 6-year-old Misha, the 1997-98 Gift of Life child from Russia, came to my home Oswego Rotary Club meeting after undergoing a successful heart operation in Syracuse. With his wide eyes twinkling, he stood on a platform so he could see over the lectern and gaze into the sea of misty-eyed Rotarians who were so taken with this lovable child. In broken English, he said just three words which released the floodgates of emotion. "Thank you, Rotary," he said, mustering as much courage as he could. Misha thanked us for saving his life, but what he could not know was that we were thanking him for giving us the opportunity to do what Rotarians do best: identify a problem and solve it.

Why are you in Rotary? What was your defining moment – the moment that cemented your relationship with Rotary? The answer to this question may go a long way in determining what kind of relationship you have with Rotary. Rotarians have varying degrees of commitment. Some are intense; some luke-warm.

Where do you fall on this scale? **We all need to evaluate our commitment to Rotary.**

Are you basically a social member, one who shows up at the weekly meetings to have a meal and chat with other members? When it comes time to volunteer for community, vocational, or club service projects, do you beg off with a variety of excuses? When asked to support The Rotary Foundation, do you find reasons not to get involved because it does not involve your home community?

If you have honestly answered "yes" to any of the preceding questions, you need to re-evaluate why you are a Rotarian. This means you have not been touched, have not had that defining moment. That touching comes in a variety of ways. We can be moved by a Rotarian program, or by a person whom Rotary has helped. We can be motivated by someone in our club or another club – someone who lives and breathes Rotary and what it stands for. We can also grow gradually in Rotary through education and information – understanding the good Rotary does in the world through The Rotary Foundation.

Most of us became Rotarians because we wanted to help others – whether in our community or in our world. How well are we meeting this objective? Aside from our commitment to Rotarian principles, we need to find other like-minded people in our community who can help further our Rotary cause. This is at the heart of the Rotary Quest program for this Rotary year – one new member a month with a net gain of five per club.

We are closing in on 2001-02's Rotary Foundation giving goal. As of Feb.28, annual giving is at \$42,109 or about 65 % of our \$65,000 goal. Total giving, which includes annual giving, restricted giving (PolioPlus, Matching Grants, World Fund, etc.) and Permanent Fund, is \$53,996 as of Feb. 28. **Top clubs ranked by annual giving per capita** are: *Tully*, \$175, *Oriskany Falls*, \$133.75, and *Syracuse Sunrise*, \$90.57. **Top clubs ranked by total annual giving** are: *Utica*, \$5,662.50, *Skaneateles*, \$4,510, and *Oswego*, \$4,046. **The leaders in total giving** are: *Oswego*, \$6,458; *Eastwood*, \$6,255, and *Utica*, \$5,662.50. The following

clubs have shown no donations to annual giving as of Feb. 28: *Adirondack Foothills*, *Aurora*, *Camden*, *Dolgeville*, *Herkimer*, *Kuyahoorra Valley*, *Little Falls*, *Liverpool*, *Oneida Shores*, *Solvay-Geddes*, *West Winfield* (who donated \$125 restricted giving)

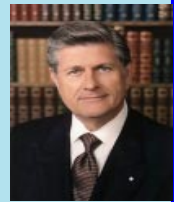

The Rotary Int'l Board of Directors at its Feb 2002 meeting was faced with the dilemma of having to defer a number of initiatives because of financial constraints resulting from significantly decreased investment income this year. Two matters were deemed to be of such importance to the future of the organization that they could not be postponed. The first was a plan for the extension of Rotary into Islamic countries, an effort that has been the focus of much energy and continuing effort. The second vital area requiring immediate action is strategic planning for the organization. As the centennial approaches, it is vital that Rotary Int'l have a clear vision for the future and that this vision be shared by Rotarians around the world. A major planning effort has been developing over the past several years, and the Board is committed to moving this effort forward.



Rotary International Board of Directors February Meeting Results

The board: -- encourages clubs to use the Rotary emblem in community activities and use the Rotary name and emblem on cards and stationery.
-- encourages future Rotary International presidents to consider scheduling the Rotaract Committee to meet.
-- encourages future presidents to develop a Presidential Citation specifically for Rotaractors with first awards given in 2003-04.
-- requests Trustees consider requiring Ambassadorial Scholars, as part of their studies, to participate in

local Rotaract club.
-- encourages Rotary clubs to waive any membership fee for members between ages of 30-35.
-- agrees that because individuals join a Rotary club rather than RI, most effective Rotary public relations occurs at local level.
-- encourages clubs to allocate a portion of club's & district's annual budgets for increasing public awareness of Rotary activities within the community.
-- encourages Rotary leaders

eligible to participate in Zone Institutes to attend institutes organized in adjacent zones to share information.
-- amends Rotary Code of Policies as follows: The number of assistant governors appointed based on needs of each district, taking into consideration geography, language, culture, balance of strong & weak clubs in each area, and number of clubs an assistant governor can reasonably be expected to support (between 4 and 8 clubs per assistant governor).

Community Assistance Programs by DG Bruce Frassinelli

Congratulations to the seven Rotary clubs chosen to receive \$1,000 CAP funds.

Cazenovia: establish a Rotary Reading Corner in a local food pantry called Cazenovia Cares.

DeWitt: refurbish and supply a recreation area for the "People in Action" program in DeWitt.

Dolgeville: fund a series of free art and music workshops for youth to provide safe after-school activities in community. Hand-drumming and face-mask workshops will be among activities.

Marcellus: To help save lives through cardiopulmonary resuscitation instruction and the use of automatic external defibrillators. The first phase of this program would be to train Rotarians in the use of CPR and AED.

North Syracuse: To help finance a "Books on Wheels" program, a delivery service of materials to patrons unable to go to the Northern Onondaga Public Library. The library and Rotary club would find the patrons and select the materials to be delivered once a month.

Solvay-Geddes: fund a new youth program for 14-18 year-olds to participate in weightlifting.

Utica: finance a "Let's Grow A Community Garden" project in cooperation with JCTOD Outreach Inc, involving inner-city children in the development of a garden. Some 50 to 60 children will prepare the ground and plant flowers, vegetables, fruit.

Winning projects were selected by a four-member committee appointed by DG Bruce. Chair Ron Ramsden, Marcellus Rotary, was joined by DGN/AG Andrea Ives, PDG Ward Vuillemot and AG Don St. Louis. In concurring with the decisions, DG Bruce sent letters to the eight honorable mention clubs thanking them for sending applications and encouraging them to consider resubmitting them for 2002-03.

The Community Assistance Program provides an opportunity for Rotary districts to use district designated funds to undertake service projects in their communities as a way of furthering The

Rotary Foundation's objective of world understanding and peace.

The program began in January of 2001 and will run through October 2003 as a pilot program. After this, the program will be evaluated by Rotary officials to determine whether it should become a permanent part of the Foundation program.

The maximum amount available to designate to the program is 10 percent of the district's annual giving in the prior year, up to \$10,000. Last year's annual giving was a bit more than \$70,000, allowing District 7150 about \$7,000 to distribute. To try to involve as many clubs as possible, District Governor Bruce chose to set up a program that brings \$1,000, the minimum allowable per award, to the greatest number of community projects in the district.

"Thanks to all 15 clubs which submitted applications," District Governor Bruce said. "The CAP program has been successful and drawn a lot of club interest".

Governor Presents Specially Struck Eagle Membership Pins

DG Bruce presented two add'l **membership awards** to Rotarians who have brought in a minimum of 3 new members to their clubs this Rotary year.

On April 3, the governor presented the **specially struck eagle membership pin to Marlene Brown**, president of New Hartford Rotary Club, as he helped induct her fourth new member of the year, Matt Renninger. On March 19, he presented the eagle membership pin to **LeRoy Kettinger**,

Auburn Rotary Club President, who has brought in three new members since July 1. Both clubs have shown solid membership growth thanks to these infusions of new members by their club presidents.

In praising their accomplishments, DG Bruce commended them for "leading by example," that should inspire not only their club members but Rotarians throughout the district to take the Rotary Global Quest to heart. **DG Bruce Frassinelli** was similarly honored April 9 at the Oswego Rotary Club meeting when

Area Membership Director Vern Tryon presented him with the eagle membership pin for bringing in three new members.

The first eagle membership award was presented by DG Bruce to **PDG Dave Peterson** of the West Winfield Rotary Club last November for bringing in three new members.

Our second major effort in 2002-2003 will be to establish activities leading to Rotary's 100th Anniversary celebration in February of 2005. This three year District project will be led by the current President of New Hartford Rotary, **Marlene Brown**. Her drive and initiative will carry us over the next three years as clubs and Rotarians look to the 100th Anniversary of Rotary.

D7150 RYLA Seminar July 24-26, 2002 by Chair Ray Allen

Rotary Youth Leadership Award Applications for high school students between 15 and 18 years old are available for those interested in applying to our District 7150's second RYLA Seminar. Copies have been sent to all clubs for sponsoring students. Application can also be downloaded from RYLA page on D7150 Website: www.rotarydistrict7150.org.

There are 30 openings so get your applications in quickly. **Close out date is June 10th**. Cost of the seminar, is to be paid by their sponsoring Rotary Club, and is \$225.00 per student including seminar materials, room and meals. District clubs are encouraged to identify candidates and alternates for participation. Call Ray Allen at 315-732-3883 with questions.

RYLA seminar will be held July 24-26, 2002 at Mohawk Valley Community College, in Utica, NY. Registration will be at 10am on July 24th with a graduation luncheon at noon on July 26th hosted by the Utica Rotary Club at Twin Ponds

Country Club. RYLA parents will be invited to the luncheon.

The program includes lectures, participatory group activities, discussion periods directed at leadership training, a Ropes Course to teach team building, communication and trust recognition skills. Teams will be set up with each having a project to complete by seminar's end. Community leaders, MVCC faculty, & Rotarians will be seminar leaders & guest speakers. Students will stay in MVCC dorms with Rotarian chaperones.

Rotarians are encouraged to consider their children and grandchildren, who meet the candidate criteria, apply to the seminar. The program requires self-awareness, previously exhibited leadership qualities, communicate effectively.

Selection criteria are:

Age: high school students between the ages of 15-18 years.

Academic Level: Candidates in high school. 10th-12th grade

Drugs: Not been or currently involved in drugs

Medical: Not have any medical, mental or physical conditions that

would preclude active participation in all program activities

Availability: Be available for the full duration of the seminar including residence on campus and attendance at graduation luncheon.

Suggested Leadership Activities:

- * Hold high school student govts, clubs, athletics, leadership position.
- * Significant project involvement: ie. school class project, Science Fair, Jr Achievement, school play, etc.
- * In 4-H, FFA, Scouting, Church or other community leadership roles
- * Leader of Interact Club
- * A Rotary Exchange Student
- * School or sports involvement
- * Volunteer worker in community

Awards: Recognized by school, organizations and / or community for outstanding scholastic, athletic, and other exemplary achievements.

Potential: To become a Community Leader and Supporter.

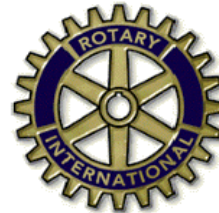
