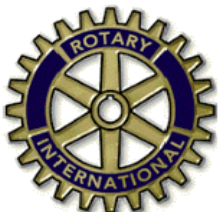

"Service Above Self"

About 11 months ago, at our 2001 Dist Conf in Saratoga, we announced that the **2002 Conference would be held in Sturbridge, MA** at the Sturbridge Host Hotel and Resort, directly across the road from the restored, Old Sturbridge Village. *Since this will be "Fall" in New England*, we also announced we only had 149 rooms available each night in the host hotel. As of August 13, we have Pre-Registrations for 138 of those rooms.

On August 15th, everyone who has pre-registered will be sent the final conference package information and payment form. This is due back to Registration HQ at MVCC no later than Friday, Sept 6, 2002. Needless to say, we expect a complete sell-out! Since we do have some rooms still available, they will be sold on a first-come-first serve basis for those completing the form (available on the District Website) and paying the \$70. per Rotarian Pre-registration fee. Those registrants will then also receive the final package for meals, rooms and optional selections. *The special Rotary price for hotel rooms* (\$99. for up to four in the room) is also available for the evenings of Oct 17 and Oct 20. Once the 11 remaining host hotel rooms are sold, we will be presenting conference packages including just the meetings, activities and meals. There are a number of hotels in the immediate Sturbridge Area so accommodations should not be a major problem. The Host Conference Committee will supply you with a list of places to stay. We have plenty of space for meals and conference activities, but due to timing, hotel rooms are at a premium!

We did expect this to be a popular conference. The Fall in New England, especially in Central Mass is just beautiful. Old Sturbridge Village is an

attraction in itself! Our conference will feature a variety of specialized Rotary presentations. In addition to House of Friendship "cookie presentations", we will feature late evening hospitality, sponsored by the host club, Utica (& maybe some Utica Club?) **Friday evening**, we will be recognizing Club Presidents, Past District Governors, current D7150 Officers. Saturday evening we will feature an informal banquet inside Old Sturbridge Village at the brand new Sturbridge Tavern.

We will be focusing on Eradicate Polio Campaign, 100th Anniversary Celebration, Make A Difference Day, Gift of Life, Gift of Vision and a taped presentation by RI President Bhichai Rattakul. You will meet our Exchange Students and the GSE team from District 3500, Taiwan, R.O.C., hear presentations by the Literacy Committee as well as remarks from our R. I. Presidential Representative. **Friday** at 1:00pm we will feature the D7150 Annual Meeting. In addition to the reports, we will vote on resolutions and possible restructuring of Ass't Governor assignments. At 3:00pm we will hear reports on outstanding projects in the four avenues of service. Club Presidents will have several sessions on District and Club activities, including meeting the criteria for the Presidential Citation.

Saturday afternoon, we have several options available, including a bus trip to Boston with free time in Quincy market area. Proceeds from our District Golf Tournament at a local course will go to the Eradicate Polio Campaign. **Sunday morning**, we will conduct the Rotary Inter-Faith Service and complete the conference with a presentation on the 2003 Conference. The Sunday activities will be conducted "lake-side". All of this information, as well as the final payment details will be **available on the District Website by August 22.**

National Make A Difference Day & D7150's Rotary Foundation *by DG Don Reese*

In 2001, PDG Bruce Frassinelli began a great new project, participation in **National Make a Difference Day** (NMADD). Organized through USA Weekend, this is a great way for our District Rotarians and Clubs to make an immediate impact in their local community. In fact, *through Bruce's efforts* and those of the participating clubs, our District not only won **National Recognition**, but was recently featured in a full page article in *The Rotarian!* Like I have said, Bruce is a tough act to follow! So, with that in mind, I have asked him to be our District Chair for NMADD this year. I am pleased he has accepted!

So mark the day, Saturday October 26, 2002, NMADD. As Bruce said, this is a chance for every Rotarian in the District to *do a "good deed" for the day.* In collaboration with other club members and perhaps even other clubs, this is a great place for Community Service. **Projects** should be framed in a one-day time period, usually 3-4 hours or so. They should not be on-going projects or open ended ones; they should be **unique for this day.** While October 26th is the "official" day, we realize that due to religious

or other reasons, the project may be accomplished several days before or afterwards. PDG Bruce will send information to all club presidents for distribution to their Community Service chairs or MADD Chairs. There will also be a **special presentation** at the District Conference in Sturbridge on this outstanding District, Club and Rotarian project.

One of my personal goals for this year is to have 75% of the clubs participate in this community service project....34 clubs! So, motivated Rotarians...what can you do to make a difference in your neighborhood? **What a great way to show Service Above Self!** Please contact PDG Bruce for further details.

PDG Ward Vuillemot reported that our District had a sensational year with respect to **Club and Rotarian giving to The Rotary Foundation.** Governor Bruce had set a goal of \$60,000 for Annual Giving. Through the efforts of the Foundation Committee, Chaired by Don Cossette & PDG Ward, + hundreds of dedicated Rotarians, we gave **\$82,789.40. This represents 127.38% of the goal!** Outstanding! Forty percent of this goes to the Share Funds World Fund:

\$33,119.36. Sixty percent of this total, or \$49,679.04 will come back to the district three years from now as our District Designated Funds.

Top Clubs ranked by Annual Giving per Capita: **Tully** \$200; **Oriskany Falls** \$138.75; **Fulton Sunrise** \$115.79

Top Clubs by Total Annual Giving: **Syracuse** \$13,645; **Utica** \$45,762.50; **Rome** \$5,729.36

In overall, total giving, our District Goal was \$88,950. Our actual overall contributions totaled \$99,198 or 111.5%. In this total, our **Top Clubs** ranked by Total Giving per Capita:

Tully \$200; **Eastwood** \$175.37; **Oriskany Falls** \$138.75

Top Clubs ranked by overall, total giving: **Syracuse** \$13,645; **Eastwood** \$7,190; **Oswego** \$7,158

Of our 45 clubs, 43 contributed to the Rotary Foundation This year we have an Annual Giving Goal of \$68,000 and an overall Foundation Goal of \$88,000. Of course, we also have the Polio Eradication Campaign Goal of \$300,000 over three years.

ship to 1.5 million members, support Rotary Foundation's goal of US\$100 per member in donations to Annual Programs Fund.

Rotary clubs are asked to **initiate a new Centennial Community Service Project** that fulfills a real need in the community, and provides a permanent identification of the sponsoring Rotary club.

Clubs are asked to **register their**

Centennial projects with R.I. by January 2003. All projects must be completed by February 2005.

The D7150 Centennial Committee will be getting further information out to all Area Clubs. **The party's ready to begin!**

Club Polio Eradication Success Kits Available Now by Chair PDG Ed Paparella

The Polio Eradication Fund Raising Campaign is well underway here in our District and throughout the Rotary World. Over 30,000 Rotary Clubs Worldwide are closing in on the most ambitious Humanitarian Project taken on by Rotary in its near 100-year history. To complete the task we started, to Eradicate Polio in the World some 17 years ago, Rotary has made a final commitment to raise in pledges and donations \$80 million this Rotary Year. Each District in the Rotary World will establish a Polio Campaign goal. **Our goal** established by District Governor Don Reese and the Polio Eradication Committee **is \$300,000.**

District 7150 was very generous during the 1985-1988 original Polio Campaign raising over \$500,000. The goal of \$300,000 was established based on our desire to also continue our generosity in the Annual & Permanent Fund Campaign, give everyone an opportunity to participate, stand by our promise made 17 years ago to

Eradicate Polio in the World and once and for all rid the world of this deadly crippling disease. **The pledge you make can be paid over the next 3 Rotary Years** to ensure participation by everyone and to spread the commitment for ease of payment.

As you know each Club in our District has a **Polio Eradication Campaign Area Coordinator.** Our District Directory list's all of them, how to make contact and their Club Assignments. They are: Area 1: **Mike Occhipinti**, PDG; Area 2: **Don St. Louis**; Area 3 - **Joe Bearman**; Area 4 - **Andy Zaplatynsky**; Area 5 - **Jim Austin**, DGN; Area 6 - **Andrea Ives**, DGE. The Area Coordinator has the responsibility to assist and support the Club in establishing the Club goal and being successful in achieving the goal. Please work closely with the Area Coordinator in making this District Campaign another great success. **The Club Polio Eradication Success Kits are being distributed by the Area Coordinators.** Give them a call to see how easy it will be to achieve your Club Polio goal.

As you consider your personal financial commitment to this campaign take a moment to review the highlights below, to see how far we

have come. Feel good & be proud of our accomplishments. We have an opportunity to show the World, Rotary with its staying power, will not rest until the last child is saved and Polio Is Eradicated.

Since 1988 polio cases have dropped by 99% going from 125 countries to 10 endemic countries. Rotary's contributions will exceed \$500 million by 2005. **More than 2 billion children have been immunized** with the help of Rotary. Over 10 million volunteers have been mobilized by Rotary. More than 500,000 cases of polio are now prevented each year. The savings when Polio Is Eradicated and immunizations can cease will be over \$1.5 billion annually.

In 1988, 10% of the world's children lived in polio-free countries; **today more than 70%** are living in polio-free countries. **Please help us Fulfill Our Promise - Eradicate Polio.**

The 2002-2003 Presidential Citation by DGE Don Reese

Each year, the **Rotary International President establishes criteria** as goals/ objectives for clubs to reach during the Rotary year. When a club meets or exceeds these goals / objectives this year, they will be awarded The Presidential Citation from Bhichai Rattakul. From last month's CREDO, you know that one of my personal goals as District Governor is to have 100% of the District's Clubs earn the recognition of a Presidential Citation.

President Bhichai believes that meaningful change and peace must grow from the grassroots and not from the top down. With this in mind, the 2002-2003 Presidential Citation encourages grassroots efforts of Rotarians and Rotary Clubs. In your clubs, you can Sow the Seeds of Love to foster fellowship and membership, participate in the Rotary Foundation and commit yourself to the four avenues of service.

In President Bhichai's words, "I have intentionally not prescribed specific achievements for Rotary Clubs, favoring the insight and input of Rotarians that can best measure and determine the potential in their own clubs. You are asked as a club to set and meet your own goals." The Club Members are the key to the success of Rotary!

Criteria for Presidential Citation:

1. Attain the annual membership goal established by your club.

Your club's membership strategy should be consistent with the overall membership goals of RI which would include increasing new membership, improving membership retention and supporting the organization of new clubs.

2. Participate in or financially support a project or program of the Rotary Foundation.

3. Initiate or continue to strengthen a well-rounded program

of at least one activity within each of the Four Avenues of Service: Club; Vocational; Community; and International Service

Once these goals have been met within the time frame, please **complete the Certification Form** (900IB) and send it to me as District Governor. I will then certify the activities your club has accomplished and forward it to RI in Evanston, IL. These forms must be received by RI no later than April 15, 2003. I need to sign them, so please get them to me **no later than April 1, 2003**.

Throughout the year, your Assistant Governor will be using these criteria as one measurement of your club's success for 2002-2003. During the Conference at Sturbridge, we will have a presentation for the Club Presidents on achieving this award. **Let's have 100% for this!**

Rotary's International Scholarship by Chair Charlie Young

Rotarians often overlook the International Scholarships when they discuss, plan, and implement their programs. **The two international programs** - the *Ambassadorial Scholarships* and the *Peace Scholarships* - are ways in which we, as Rotarians, can contribute to international peace and understanding without directly spending money. Satisfaction comes from helping bright, young people realize their educational dreams by getting one of these scholarships.

At first, the programs seem the same, but there are some important, fundamental differences. **The Ambassadorial Scholarship program** offered by District 7150 is open to competition by students who reside within the district. School residency does not count.

Applicants can study in any of the 162 countries (excluding the United States) where there are Rotary Clubs, and it can be in any field of endeavor. It is a one year program worth up to \$25,000, and is open to college Juniors and Seniors, as well as graduates. The applicant should be well focused on the ultimate goal of their education. This past

year, due to a lack of money, District 7150 offered, as a replacement, a 6 month language-cultural scholarship. There were no applicants. Hopefully, this year the district will again offer a full year scholarship. For further info, contact Norm Kolb, Utica Club.

The Peace Scholarship was first offered last year. Rotary International offers 70 scholarships each year for a Master's Degree in Peace Studies. The scholars must study at one of the Rotary Centers set up around the world in existing universities.

American students can not study in the United States where there are Centers at Duke/University of North Carolina and University of California at Berkeley. The other five Centers are located in England, France, Argentina, Australia, and Japan. While French is required in Paris, and Spanish is required in Argentina, instruction elsewhere is in English. This two year program is worth up to \$50,000. For further information, contact Charlie Young of the Oswego Sunrise Club.

District 7150 was fortunate in having their candidate, Arnoldas Princkevicius, selected as a member of the first class of Peace Scholars. This summer, he has

lectured and judged at an international debate camp, and he is currently working as an intern with the Lithuanian Foreign Ministry. He will go to Paris in September for a one month orientation/language course prior to the start of formal studies in October. He sends his heartfelt thanks to D7150 Rotarians.

This year, there is a possibility that there will be three applicants for the Peace Scholarship. Committee members DGN Jim Austin and Paul Nelson of Moravia, along with Young, will interview candidates on August 2 and 21.

All Rotarians should get involved in finding suitable candidates for these international scholarships. Many have neighbors or friends who have children who would be good candidates. The local media highlights young people who would be suitable. What it takes is for you to make the initial contact and contact a member of the Ambassadorial Scholarship Committee, or the Peace Scholarship Committee.

There are many possible applicants in District 7150. Let's contact them!
