Forward Looking:

Inspiring a Shared Vision:

Looking toward and beyond the horizon. Envision the future with a positive and hopeful outlook. Champion commitment to a common purpose.

Encouraging the Heart:

2000-01 Group Study Exchange w/England by **DGE Ward Vuillemot**

D7150 2000-01 Group Study Exchange will be with District 1050, located in the Manchester area of England.

District 1050 has 1316 members in 45 Rotary Clubs as of the 1999 RI Directory.

Our GSE Team will be in England from **9 Sept to 10 Oct 2000** and will attend the D1050 Conference. D1050's GSE Team will travel with our team back to the US to visit our district from 10 Oct to 5 Nov 2000 and will attend our conference in Toronto.

D1050 has selected Terry Corrigan, from the Buxton Club, Derbyshire, England as their Team Leader. Terry has been a Rotarian for 18 years and is a retired Chief Supt of Police. He has been very active in Rotary, is a past president of his club and also very active in his community.

As the time schedule has been compressed by 7 months with the back-to-back exchange, we are kicking off our recruitment of Team Leader (TL) and Team Members (TM) in January in order to give our team adequate preparation time.

WE NEED YOUR HELP! We have scheduled **interviews for Team Leader for 6 Feb. 2000, 1-5pm** at Oneida-Madison BOCES off Rte 365, Thruway Exit 33. TLs must be Rotarians in good standing, be well informed about Rotary and the District communities, have an outgoing personality, be able to lead others and be

able to take four weeks away from work and family. They also must be able to facilitate and lead the team orientation sessions and the team while abroad. There are no age requirements for TL other than he/she must be able to keep pace with the vigorous program of study planned by the hosting district. TLs can not be a DG, DGN or immediate PDG. TLs do not have to have held a District Office.



We have scheduled **interviews for Team Members for 27 Feb. 2000**, at O-M BOCES. TMs must be Non-Rotarians and not blood relative of a Rotarian. They must be between 25 and 40 years of age in order to have the maximum impact on their long term career development when they return. They must be US citizens, in good health, neat in appearance and able to express themselves logically, have a sound educational and professional background and be enthusiastic about their chosen vocation. They should be open-minded, tolerant, flexible and able to live within and adopt a different culture during the exchange period. They must be willing and able to follow the direction of the TL. TMs must be able to participate in team orientations and take the four weeks of the exchange away from work and family.

Clubs should begin actively recruiting Team Leader and Member candidates now and return completed applications to the District GSE Committee

Chair, Ray Allen at least one week before the scheduled interview dates. Mail them to Ray at 10308 Ridgecrest Rd, Utica, NY 13502. For questions contact him Tel-315-732-3883, E-mail: rallen@borg.com

A part of GSE is also hosting the D1050 Team. We need to identify clubs wishing host the D1050 Team. This is a great opportunity to meet and get to know people from other cultures, and improve opportunities for understanding and world peace. Those who have participated in the past have had very positive experiences.

Suggestions for recruiting TMs. Candidates should be plentiful for this exchange as there are no language concerns. Contact the CEO or owner of companies in your area, and local government heads. Make them aware of the program. Ask if they have an employee they would like to nominate to participate. Point out their employee will come back with an understanding of how their job is performed in England, able to be a better employee for them.

Explain to them that program expenses are paid by Rotary and all they have to provide is the four weeks off from work, the method being solely between them and their employee. Give them a copy of the RI GSE brochure. Encourage members to talk with friends and fellow employees to identify potential participants. Make sure to follow-up with all contacts.

Outbound Candidates Selected for 2000-01 *by YE Chair Al Kalter*

After two weekends of interviews in early January, the District 7150 Youth Exchange Committee has identified its "*Class of 2000*", the high school students who will represent Central New York in 26 different countries during the 2000-01 school year.

Over 40 applications were received this year, and the committee proudly selected over 30 candidates to participate in the outbound program.

The lengthy and difficult interview process yielded some good insight into the applicants' suitability, as well as giving committee members and Rotex participants a feel for which country each student might fit best. Watch next month's CREDO for the official list of our Class of 2000-01.

Those students who were accepted, and who in turn agree to participate in the program, will go through three orientations through the spring. The first session, scheduled for March 5, will focus on foreign language acquisition and public speaking. The second, on April 2, will provide students and parents with information on finances, travel, insurance, medical care.

And finally, during the weekend of June 10-11, the outbound designees will spend two days discovering what culture is all about, learning the keys to success as exchange students, and exploring their own capabilities and, perhaps, liabilities.

Our District's orientation program is as thorough and relevant as any in Rotary, and our students are often recognized as the best prepared in their host countries.

Most of the students who come to Central New York as Rotary exchange students arrive in August. But each year, a small number from the southern hemisphere begin their exchange years here during January.

So it was that, in recent weeks, we bid difficult goodbyes to Pato Olivera (Argentina), Kristen Banks (Australia), and Rhys Bailey (New Zealand).

But January is also a time to welcome new friends, and so we offered greetings to two new inbounds from Australia, Sarah



Woodham and Oliver Loughlin, pictured above, hosted by the Kuyahoorra Valley and Utica clubs, respectively. Our third January arrival is Laura Nardelli from Argentina, whose host club is Cato.

You can bet that all three of these kids, leaving the warmth of summer in their home countries, had a bit of a shock when they were first exposed to our

version of winter, as temperatures hovered near zero (Fahrenheit) during the week of their arrival. But the warmth of the people in our District is sure to get them through it, and provide them all with a wonderful year full of experiences, friends, and fun.

Reminders to Club Presidents/Secretaries

By now, you should have sent to Evanston, as well as to DG Herb and DGE Ward, the Officers Report for the Official Directory. This was due by 31-December-99. If you have not done it or if the President-Elect, Secretary-Elect and/or Meeting Place/Time data has changed, please contact your Assistant Governor immediately. (If you act promptly, the correct data will appear in the Official Directory.)

This month, you must update and return to RI the SAR (Semi Annual Report) that your club received from Evanston in Dec-99. That is, you must -

1. Complete the SAR Worksheet that both of you must sign and your Board of Directors must approve.
2. Obtain corresponding

check from your Club Treasurer.

3. Modify the Listing of Members that Evanston sent you along with the Worksheet.

4. Make two (2) copies of both the Worksheet and the Listing of Members, plus 1-each for your records, and mail 1-each of both as follows:

- (a) To the District Secretary.
- (b) To the District Treasurer, along with the check for the Membership Levy for the total number of members not including Honoraries (Line 5 of the Worksheet).

5. Return the completed originals, along with the check, to Evanston.

If Evanston does not receive the



check in due time, it will charge your account the same amount as your last payment.

As you may have noticed, the Summary table at the end of this issue still shows Clubs whose monthly reports are missing. This situation has been happening every month, although the Clubs at fault tend to vary and in spite of the efforts of Assistant Governors.

I receive reports that don't name the Club, omit one of the 3 values that should be included, and/or show an unreasonable value. In addition, some clubs indicate a gain or loss of members, but we never see the District's copy of the Membership Add/Change/Delete forms that should be sent to Evanston and DG Herb.

The Rotary Leadership Institute *by DGE Ward Vuillemot*

D7150 has joined Zone 31 & 32 districts in support of the Rotary Leadership Institute. This is an opportunity to participate in quality leadership & Rotary information training sessions. This forum, in place since 1992, has evolved into one of the Rotary world's premiere learning experiences.

The first session to be held in our region will be in Binghamton NY on Saturday, March 18th, 2000. This is an exciting opportunity to learn more about Rotary and work on skills required to provide effective leadership in voluntary organization.

The following Frequently Asked questions will provide you with the facts and description of the Rotary Leadership Institute.

What are the courses?

The Institute offers a leadership development program in three full day sessions (Parts 1, 11 and 111). The courses are designed to provide Rotary knowledge and to develop leadership skills for voluntary organizations. Examples of course sessions include, "The Perfect Meeting", "Problem Solving", "Effective Committees", "Membership Development", "Public Speaking", "Leadership Problems", "Creative Service", "Written Communication", "Motivating & Effecting Change."

Held when and where?

Courses are held at various locations throughout the year to accommodate the Rotary clubs of the member districts. Any nominee may take a course in any location. Course locations and dates are announced in governors' newsletters and at various district events.

What are teaching methods?

The Institute believes in course sessions with as much discussion/participation as possible. Discussion breakout sessions are limited to 10-15 persons. Lectures are strictly lim-

ited. Course methods include discussion groups, role-playing, creating projects and audiovisual presentations. Everyone participates during one of the Institute's sessions. A course workbook provided contains an Institute Manual, session program agendas, faculty biographies, course outlines and materials.

Who are the faculty?

Faculty members are carefully selected by the Institute for their teaching abilities. They are drawn from all areas of the member districts and occasionally from outside. Many are present and past R.I. directors, district governors, successful past presidents and those with experience in special areas. Each new faculty member must attend a train-



ing program and the regular faculty members must attend a one-day reorientation program at least once every two years. The results of evaluations help to improve the course content and instruction.

Why need the institute?

Rotary needs a constant influx of leadership as club officers change every year. It is difficult at the club level to learn enough about the exciting world of Rotary with its 1.2 million members in 162 countries. Furthermore, leadership skills in a voluntary organization are often different from business leadership skills. It is important that club leaders have every opportunity for education as the success or failure of our clubs depends their lead-

ers quality.

Who to nominate?

The Institute recommends that candidates should have qualities that mark them as potential club leaders, not necessarily future presidents. They should be at least 3-4 years away from a possible presidency or other high leadership post. They should have a strong interest in Rotary and be ready to be exposed to the larger world of Rotary. The Institute requests each club to nominate one or two Rotarians each year.

What are the costs?

The current course fees are \$80 per registrant per day. The fees include breakfast, lunch, coffee breaks and considerable materials given to participants. Course fees also pay for meeting space, audio-visual equipment and promotional costs. Institute faculty members are not paid. We recommend clubs pay the fees for their nominees.

Should we participate?

If your club cares about its future, it will want the best leadership possible. This is an opportunity for each club to improve the Rotary knowledge of its key people who will be exposed to new ideas of leadership they will hopefully share with club members. The exchange of ideas with other experienced Rotarians alone makes the courses worthwhile.

What do I do next?

Inform your club president of your interest in the Institute. Each club president may nominate qualified Rotarians, using the registration form which can be obtained from your AG, or Dist Trainer PDG Ed Paparella
