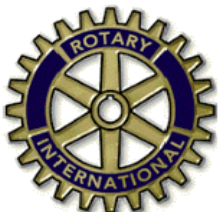

District 7150 Goals: 2002-03

When I got back to my office on the evening of July 1, I read an e-mail from Dennis McDermott, Chair of the District Youth Exchange Committee - Year Program. Dennis was letting me know about some information on YE, then, as a parting note, wrote to me... "*Congratulations on surviving day one! Only 364 to go!*" I really did appreciate the thoughts. (I'm not sure *how* I survived that day).

But as usual, that got me to thinking about the next "364" days in the Rotary Year 2002-2003. At the District Assembly, I went over a draft version of the District Goals for 2002-2003. As I have said on a number of occasions, following in the footsteps of Rotarians like Ward Vuillemot and Bruce Frassinelli is not an easy task. Both of them have dedicated years of their life to the cause of Rotary...and it shows in a tremendously positive way. Our membership is up... our Annual Giving to the Rotary Foundation is up and Rotary in general has been recharged and uplifted by our Past District Governors.

This is a very special year for Rotary. *We are on the verge of eliminating polio* from the face of the earth and we are beginning the planning of our 100th Anniversary. What a combination!

As you know, I believe very strongly in our "District Team Approach". Rotary changes its leadership every year, without fail.

That creates new ideas...visions and goals. Our District Team, with Andrea Ives as DGE and Jim Austin as DGN, along with all of the members of the District Council are prepared to help each and every club achieve their own goals and objectives for 2002-2003.

Right now, our Assistant Governors, all strong team members in their own right, following the District Leadership Plan, are meeting with each Club's officers and board members to review their individual goals and objectives. Following their "Club Visits", I will be commencing the Official Visits in early August. In this way, we will be carrying out the "Bottoms Up" approach as advocated by RI President Bhichai Rattakul of Thailand.

Again...*please mark the evening of November 12, 2002 on your calendars.* On that evening, President Bhichai will be at The Beeches in Rome. This will be the first time in nearly 20 years that a sitting RI President has been to our District. While I was in Barcelona, I spoke to President Bhichai and his aide. They are both looking forward to visiting our District. Please see Dave Kobernuss or Don Schlueter of the Rome Rotary Club for tickets.

So, with all of that in mind, here are the goals for the District 7150 Leadership Team for 2002-2003:

1. **Have Fun!**
2. In the form of cash or pledges over 2002-2005, **raise \$300,000 for the Eradicate Polio Campaign.** (A lot more on this as we start the year).

3. **100%** Club representation at the **District Conference** in Sturbridge, Massachusetts.

4. Club Extension... **Add Three (3) new clubs** in 2002-2003... bringing the District number to 48 Rotary Clubs. What a great way to "*Sow the Seeds of Love*".

5. Have **100%** of the District Clubs earn the **Presidential Citation** for 2002-2003.

6. Have **100%** Club Representation at the **visit of President Bhichai Rattakul** on November 12, 2002.

7. **Add one (1) new Earlyact, Interact and Rotaract Club(s)** throughout the District. Continue with a very successful RYLA program.

8. **Increase Rotary Membership with 145 new, net members** in 2002-2003. Working with Dennis Schonewetter, District Membership Chair and Immediate Past President of the Rotary Club of Rome (gained 15 new, net members in 2001-2002), we worked out a suggested membership goal for the District.

Please remember... *Each club* should be setting their own membership goals for the year! As a District, we are looking for *clubs with up to 49* members to

add 3 new, net members, *clubs between 50-99* to add 4 new, net members and *clubs with 100 or more* members to add 5 new, net members. These are our Leadership Team suggestions. The District goal of 145 is needed to help President Bhichai continue the **Global Quest Campaign** of 1.5 million Rotarians by 2005.

9. Have **75%** of the District Clubs **participate in National Make A Difference Day**, scheduled for this Fall. Under the leadership of PDG Bruce Frassinelli, this is a great way for clubs to make an immediate impact in their home area. Sow The Seeds Of Love..right in your town!!!

10. Have **100%** of the Clubs **select a 100th Anniversary Project** by January 1, 2003.

11. Meet the **\$68,000 annual giving figure** for District Clubs to the Rotary Foundation. In addition, we would like the District Rotarians to consider adding **20 new benefactors, 5 bequests and one major donor**. Finally, we would like to **contribute \$20,000 to the RI Foundation** Permanent Fund.

(Note...while all of this seems like a lot of money...believe me...it is! But, including the **Eradicate Polio Campaign**, the Annual Giving and the Permanent Fund, it comes out to *about \$111.00 per*

District Rotarian for 2002-2003. That's a little more than \$2.00 per week, per member!). What a great Rotary Quest!

12. Have a successful **Group Study Exchange** with District 3500, from the Republic of China on Taiwan.

13. Have 75 District Rotarians participate in the **Rotary Leadership Institute** in April, 2003.

14. Strongly encourage clubs to **enact new projects in each of the four share in the celebration**. What a special treat it was to have them share in this outstanding Rotary moment. avenues of service. This includes expansion of our efforts to combat *Literacy* and to recruit additional students for our highly successful *Youth Exchange* Program. Another way to "*Sow the Seeds of Love*".

15. **Have Fun!!** Fellow Rotarians... we are all volunteers. Rotary is about service, and it's about having fun! **Make your club events ones that can be enjoyed by all members of your family!** Sow the Seeds of Love, each and every day... have fun while doing so! We have enough work with our jobs and careers! Make Rotary fun!

Recapping Rotary Int'l Convention in Barcelona by Marlene B. Brown, DICO



In June, Earl & I flew to Barcelona, Spain, at R.I. President King's request, to **participate in the 2003 Rotary International Convention.**

A bit about Barcelona. They are home of the first Rotary club in continental Europe, founded in 1921. By 1936, with 745 members in 27 clubs, civil war brought an end to Rotary's status in Spain. From 1936 until 1977, their government did not officially recognize Spain's Rotary clubs. However, several Rotary clubs continued to

meet. In 1976, the Govt of Spain recognized the Rotary Club of Madrid as a legal association, clearing the way for the clubs to be readmitted to Rotary Intl in 1977. Currently, Spain has over 4,000 members in 162 clubs who participate in numerous projects.

The Convention was another wonderful experience, as we joined more than 17,000 other Rotarians from 65 countries. Sessions included a focus on the world's most critical problems. Featured were humorist Jerry Lewis, who received the Rotary

Medal of Honor for his humanitarian service on behalf of children with disabilities; former President of the Soviet Union Mikhail Gorbachev, who spoke on Rotary's contribution, as a non-political, non-religious, humanitarian organization, to peace throughout the world; and Mrs. Nane Annan, wife of the UN Secretary-General, who spoke on the importance of volunteers in today's world

As you know **the Rotary Polio Eradication Campaign is underway.** We have built a strong Team in our District to coordinate this very important effort. Each of the Team Members is responsible for assisting a number of Clubs in establishing their Polio Campaign Goal and promoting a successful Campaign. To be consistent with our District Leadership structure we are using the existing Area Model for assignments. Team Members and Area's are, Area-1 Mike Occhipinti, PDG; Area-2 Don St. Louis; Area-3 Dr. Joe Bearman; Area-4 Andy Zaplatynsky; Area-5 Jim Austin, DGN, Area-6 Andrea Ives, DGE. You will be hearing from the Team Member assigned to

your Club if you have not already in the next few days. The phone numbers and e-mail addresses for the team members are located in the District Directory.

Rotary has established a worldwide goal of \$80 million to be raised by Clubs all over the world. Governor Don Reese in coordination with the Polio Eradication Team has announced a **District Polio Goal of \$300,000.** The campaign period is for 1 year, during the 2002-2003 Rotary Year with pledges payable over a 3-year period. The Team Member assigned to your Club will assist you in developing a goal and strategies in successfully achieving the goal you establish.

Rotary has made a promise to the World to eradicate Polio by the year 2005, our 100-year anniversary. The official announce-

ment will be made in Chicago, the birthplace of Rotary, at our International Convention. **We need everyone's help to** achieve the District Goal and finally, after 20 years, **put an end to this dreadful crippling virus.**

In the words of RI President Bhichai Rattakul, "One must have faith in the cause. It is this sense of mission that infuses our actions with determination, enthusiasm, sincerity, devotion, and above all—love".

Please help us make this happen, let's unite



together, Fulfilling Our Promise to Eradicate Polio.

The District 7150 Leadership Plan by DG Don Reese

Effective July 1, 2002, Rotary International requires that all 530 Rotary Districts implement the approved District Leadership Plan (DLP). Approved several years ago the plan is being fully implemented for the first time this Rotary year.

As you know, our District has 45 Clubs and approximately 1,670 Rotarians. **According to Rotary International, the ideal district has 75 clubs and 3,000 Rotarians.** So, we have a way to go! However, the overall premise of the DLP is to delegate many District Administrative duties to Committee Chairs. This will free up more time for the Dist Gov to assist clubs with achieving their goals and objectives and be a better resource person for the clubs and individual Rotarians.

A related reason for the plan is to foster more leadership roles for more Rotarians, thus increasing the numbers of candidates for District Governor and Assistant Governor. Under the plan, the position of Assistant Governor and Foundation Chair become increasingly important in the activities of the District. This gives more Rotarians the opportunity to expand their leadership and management skills and hopefully seek the DG position some day.

The most visible change under the DLP is the revision of the Official Visit by the District Governor. In the past, the DG would make an extended visit to each of the clubs, usually before the

District Conference. This would often mean at least two visits a day for several months. Needless to say, this required a total commitment of time and energy. This is why the overwhelming number of District Governors were retired when they took the position. One of the major problems with this is that in the larger districts, some clubs did not receive the Governor until six or seven months had passed. Obviously, somewhat late to discuss goals, objectives and District and Club activities.

Under the DLP we have, I have charged the AG's to meet with each of their clubs in the first six weeks of the Rotary year. In effect, they will meet with the Club President, Officers, Committee Chairs and Board to discuss the individual club's goals and leadership development plan. This is now known as the "Club Visit". Following the initial visit, the AG's will make three more official visits to each of their clubs, throughout the year. In each case, they will submit a report to the DG on the club's progress towards goals, the club's activities in support of these and district initiatives and other related information. (Note...only the first Club visit needs to be with all of the club leadership). As you are reading this article, Bruce Davis, Carol Anthony, Dick Kahler, Jim Austin, Dave Craine and Judy Young are conducting their initial

visits and reporting back to me.

The DG will still conduct the Official Visit. However, instead of spending a lot of time going over individual club goals and activities, the DG will be able to concentrate on the much larger picture of Rotary Intl, including the Campaign to Eradicate Polio, the upcoming 100th Anniversary Celebration and other District-Wide activities, such as the Conference and this year, a visit from Bhichai Rattakul. The Official Visit will begin with a 30-40 minute "pre-discussion" with the club president and whomever they wish to invite. This will be an informal meeting with emphasis on Rotary Intl and District initiatives.

All of this is a "work in progress". We obviously need to see how the system works and will most likely have to "tweak" some of the parts. But, we will be meeting the overall requirements of Rotary International, and hopefully, be able to expand the Leadership Roles of our District. **The operation of the District is not a one person show. It takes many motivated and dedicated Rotarians to "Sow the Seeds of Love".** The District Leadership Plan is an excellent way to do this. We are looking forward to a great year as we "reorganize" our almost 100 year old organization.

Changing of the Guard Wrapup by PDG Bruce Frassinelli

About 180 Rotarians gathered to hear a report from outgoing District Gov Bruce Frassinelli of the Oswego Rotary Club on the 2001-02 Rotary year and to get a glimpse of the 2002-03 year from incoming District Governor Don Reese of the Utica Rotary Club.

(DG Don's goals are listed in this month's Credo; PDG Bruce's listing were reported last month.)

Four clubs received Presidential Citations from Rotary's International President Rick King. They were: **DeWitt, Rome, Tully and West Winfield**. Two club presidents: **Dennis Schonewetter of Rome and Bill Crewell of West Winfield were honored with Presidential Citations.**

DG Bruce explained that criteria to become a Presidential Citation club or Presidential Citation president this year were extremely difficult to achieve.

Assistant Governor Jerry Gortner, chair of the Awards Committee, and DG Bruce also presented the following:

-- **Overall Avenue of Service Award: Utica Rotary Club** for its continuing and expanding program at the Columbus Elementary School and for the use of more than 50 Utica Rotarians in the supervision and execution of this much admired and emulated project..

-- **Community Service Award: Oneida Rotary Club** for its annual community Thanksgiving dinner program.

-- **Vocational Service Award: Rome Rotary Club** for initiating a program to help improve skills of those seeking employment

-- **Club Service Award: Oswego Rotary Club** for sponsoring and supporting formation of a new Rotary Club, Oswego Sunrise Rotary Club, and a new Interact Club at Oswego High School.

-- **International Service**

Award: Oneida Shores Rotary Club and Larry and Judy Lindner for overseeing a districtwide fundraising effort for Afghan refugees.

-- **Innovation Award: New Hartford Rotary Club** for its World's Best Chefs fundraiser.

-- **Communications Award: Rome Rotary Club** for its internal newsletter and external communications through the publication of news releases, feature stories and other beneficial information that advances the goals and objectives of the club.

In addition, DG Bruce gave the following special awards to:

-- **Hamilton Rotary Club** for its facilitation and sponsorship of Colgate University graduate Arnoldas Pranckevicius, one of Rotary's first 70 World Peace Scholars.

-- **Charlie Young**, provisional president of the district's newest club, the Oswego Sunrise Rotary Club, for supervising the application of Arnoldas Pranckevicius under severe deadline pressures and for organizing, supervising, overseeing the creation of the new club in an amazingly short turnaround time of just four months from the time of its first meeting.

-- **Paul Heins** of the Oswego Rotary Club, the DG's Most Valuable Rotarian Award, for serving as chair of the 2001-02 District Conference at Saratoga Springs, described by President Rick King's representative Ray Rigby as the "most outstanding conference" he had ever attended. A family emergency prevented Paul from attending the Changing of the Guard dinner, so DG Bruce presented the citation to him at a meeting of the Oswego Rotary Club on July 9.

DG Bruce also gave thanks and tokens of appreciation to assistant governors, avenue chairs and others who performed extraordinary service during the year. He **also thanked his wife, Marie**, for her invaluable assistance and support.

During the Changing of the

Guard ceremony, outgoing DG Bruce presented incoming DG Don with the traditional district DG pin. In turn, Don presented Bruce with a Past District Governor pin. Marie presented Ann, Don's wife, with the spouse-of-the-District Gov pin, and Judy Percy, outgoing president of the Oswego Rotary Club, presented the Home of the District Governor banner to Georgiana Roberts Ide, incoming president of the Utica Rotary Club.

DG Bruce presented a posthumous Paul Harris Fellow to Lindsey Schwab, an 18-year-old Mexico, N.Y., senior who was struck and killed by an auto as she helped in a roadside cleanup project May 10 along Route 104 near Mexico. The presentation was made to her parents, Eric and Deborah Schwab, who received a sustained and emotional standing ovation. Lindsey was described as a giving, selfless person who never put herself first. According to her teachers at Mexico High School, Lindsey epitomized what it meant to give back to the community, a trait they attributed to inspiration from her parents. "We know Lindsey would have been happy to have had a hand in the betterment of the lives of hundreds of less-fortunate people in the world through this donation in her name to The Rotary Foundation from District 7150," DG Bruce said. "She exemplified through her short but significant life Rotary's concept of Service Above Self." Funds for the Paul Harris Fellow came from a \$605 profit from the district's Foundtion dinner and \$395 from district funds.

Bruce and Don congratulated members of the Tully Rotary Club and event chair Jim Austin for putting on an outstanding Changing of the Guard program, which concluded with outgoing and incoming presidents of clubs present exchanging gavels, handshakes and hugs. Paul Olsen, outgoing president of the Tully club, was master of ceremonies.
