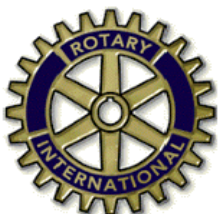

Membership is at its highest point of the year, according to the March 31 numbers. Membership has risen to 1,617, a gain of 61 from the 1,556 starting point of July 1. This is an excellent showing and does not include the 20 net new members that will show up in the April numbers with the chartering of the new Oswego Sunrise Club. The new Oswego club chartered on April 11 with 28 members, including eight from the existing Oswego Rotary Club. The *Rotary Global Quest* urges each club to add one new member a month and a net gain of five for the Rotary year. Using that as a goal, District 7150 had hoped to add 220 new members from July 1, 2001 until June 30, 2002.

The Rotary Foundation giving for this year in the district exceeded the \$65,000 established by District Governor Bruce Frassinelli. As of April 30th, the *Annual Giving Goal is \$68,833*. According to Past District Governor Ward Vuillemot, annual giving may top \$75,000. Along with restricted giving of \$14,287, total district giving stood at \$78,520, about \$11,500 less than the overall goal.

Per capita annual giving is \$40.20. Per capita total giving is \$49.14. **Tully** leads the per capita annual giving with \$175, followed by **Oriskany Falls**, \$138.75, and **Syracuse**, \$104.65. **Syracuse** leads in total annual giving with \$13,395, followed by **Utica**, \$5,662.50; and **Rome**, \$5,179.36. Top Clubs Ranked by **Total Giving per Capita: Tully** \$175.00; **Eastwood** \$169.02 **Oswego** \$138.75 Top Clubs

Total Giving Rank: Syracuse \$13,395.; **Eastwood** \$6,930.; **Oswego** \$6,558.

We were saddened to learn of the passing of Utica Rotary Club member Steve Johnson, son of F. Wright Johnson, a former district governor. Steve served most recently as district parliamentarian during the 2000-01 year. Funeral services were held April 22nd in New Hartford.

GSE Team Update: by 2001-02 Team Leader Ray Allen

It is with deep regret that DG Bruce and the GSE Committee announce that **we will not be sending a GSE Team to D3820**, The Philippines, due to the terrorist situation and unstable environment in which we would be placing our GSE Team. This decision was made after lengthy and careful consideration of the State Department reports, discussions with DG Dr Hoa and D3820 Team Leader Pedro, who visited us, and FBI security advisories.

The GSE Team Members who were selected to represent D7150 will be afforded the opportunity to be considered for the upcoming exchange with the **Republic of China, Taiwan**, District 3500, from March 21 to April 19 of 2003. The GSE team from D3500 will arrive here on Sep 28 and return home on Oct 26 of 2002. They will attend our District Conference on Oct 18-20, 2002.

Applications for the GSE exchange with Taiwan will be provided to Incoming Club Presidents at the District Assem-

bly May 18th. Clubs should begin now to identify club members who are interested in applying as **Team Leader** and professionals in your communities who are interested in becoming **Team Members**. This is the opportunity of a lifetime and will be our first in a Chinese culture.

Team Leader applications will be due back by July 1st. Team Member applications will be due back by August 1st. Team Leader interviews will be 11 August 2002 and Team Member interviews will be 10 Sep 2002. **Applications should be returned to Sadieann Zogby Spear, who will assume chair of the committee July 1, 2002.**

We will use the same format that has been successful the past two years for hosting the team from D3500. Club visits will be multi-club meetings to give an opportunity for more people to meet the team without overburdening the team with too many events. Committee members will be contacting clubs in

the near future to establish dates and locations for events. We will let you know the gender and vocations of the D3500 team as soon as we are provided that information.

Pedro ``Pete" Cootauco, leader of the Philippine Group Study Exchange Team which visited us during the late summer and early fall of 2001, **e-mailed the following to District Governor Bruce:**

Dear Bruce, It's wonderful to hear from you. I will certainly miss the group coming from your district. I do agree with your decision. Probably some other day when every thing will be stable not only in the Philippines but all over the world -- when terrorism is no longer a threat to anyone.

I am very grateful for having been hosted by your district. I learned so much from that very short period. One thing commendable was how your district professionally handled the program.

I hope someday I will have the chance to meet you again. Please extend my best regards to Marie and the district. - **Pedro**

Rotary Youth Exchange Students - by Chair Dennis McDermott



In March, 26 students were selected to be outbound exchange students for the 2002-03 year. The students have attended training sessions held on April 7 and 28, and will have a final orientation and training session on the weekend of June 8 & 9.

This is a very good group of students and they will make splendid ambassadors for the US and District 7150.

The only disappointment is that only 13 of our 45 clubs sponsored candidates for outbound placement. That means that the youth who live in 32 other communities in our district have not been given the opportunity of a lifetime. Obviously, we need to improve on that.

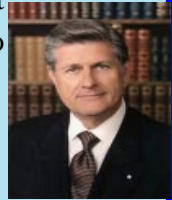

R.I. Online Catalog & Rotary Centennial Contest by Marlene B. Brown, Webmaster & ICO



The R.I. Catalog went online this past January, providing an alternative to ordering Rotary products from RI's warehouse. Rotarians can now shop or order RI publications and videos from the Online Publications Catalog. Aimed at maintaining consistency, reducing costs, and increasing efficiency in the ordering and

payment process, the online catalog requires prepayment by credit card. Organized for easy browsing, it enables Rotarians to shop for 8 categories of products.

Enter the Rotary Centennial Celebration Contest: In addition to selecting the logo, Rotarians are being asked to suggest titles for the Rotary Centennial History Book, a complete history of Rotary's first 100 years that will be available by July 2004. The members of the Centennial History Book Committee and the

D7150 a Make a Difference Day Winner by DG Bruce Frassinelli

District 7150 was among 529 national winners – and one of just two in Central New York -- cited for the scope of its participation in National Make A Difference Day October 27, 2001. The announcement was made by USA Weekend, national MADD sponsor, in its April 19-21, 2002, edition.

District Governor Bruce Frassinelli received a citation commemorating the achievement from Ronald R. Waer, publisher of The Palladium-Times newspaper in Oswego. The Palladium-Times was one of two newspaper sponsors in Central New York for local projects. (The other was the Utica Observer-Dispatch, whose winner was the Martin Luther King Jr. Elementary School.

Students there did a fundraiser and bookraiser for kids affected by the events of Sept. 11, 2001.) Nearly half the D7150 Rotary clubs rolled up their sleeves to do special projects as part of the effort. According to DG Bruce, the USA Weekend coordinators were “pleased and surprised” with the number of participants, nearly 500.

Here is how the write-up appeared in USA Weekend newspapers: “Mobilized by Rotary District 7150, 480 members, families, students and community volunteers conducted projects in six counties. Representing half of the district’s Rotary clubs, volunteers cleaned highways, served meals to the homeless, raised 9/11 funds, collected food for shelters and

gathered mittens and school supplies for needy students. One club (New Hartford) did maintenance work at a children’s museum; another (West Winfield) provided & installed lighting for an American flag flying at the town’s library.” (A full list of clubs & projects is in the Nov 2001 Credo.)

In an interview with The Palladium-Times, DG Bruce said he was “ecstatic with the level of participation.” Despite adverse weather conditions that day, many Rotarians in the district maintained their commitment to take part in events. This was the first time D7150 participated in the event collectively. “I am delighted DGE Don Reese has chosen to continue the project,” Dist Gov Bruce said.

Arnoldas Pranckevicius, D7150 Rotary Peace Scholar by DG Bruce Frassinelli

Arnoldas Pranckevicius, a Colgate University senior, has received a prestigious Rotary World Peace Scholarship from Rotary International. The United Nations recently made the announcement in NYC. He is 1 of only 70 persons so honored worldwide in the Peace Scholarship program’s inaugural year.

This Rotary Peace Scholar is the only one in Zones 31 and 32, which make up most of the Middle Atlantic & New England states, including D7150. “The fact that he was chosen from nearly 300 candidates attests to the fine qualities this young man possesses,” said DG Bruce.

“Anyone who has met Arnoldas at a D7150 function or heard him speak can agree on what an outstanding representative he is. A stroke of good fortune, I will be eternally grateful to Gov Jack Brent, from an Eastern PA

district, who contacted me. They knew of Arnoldas because he had lived there with a Rotarian family before enrolling in Colgate. That district wanted to sponsor Arnoldas, but because of the R. I. criteria, he had to be sponsored either by a club in his homeland or a club in the district where he was attending college. I appointed Oswego Rotarian Charlie Young to investigate Arnoldas credentials and make a recommendation to me and Hamilton President Susie Gustafson on whether we should sponsor him. Everyone was smitten with Arnoldas. Charlie helped speed the nomination process.”

Pranckevicius plans to use his scholarship to earn a master’s degree in international relations at Institut d’Etudes Politiques de Paris in Paris, France. Ultimately, Arnoldas says, he wants to return to his native Lithuania to help with its effort to join the European Union. “The Sciences Po graduate program will allow me to observe closely how European institu-

tions function and reform themselves in order to accommodate future European Union enlargement,” Arnoldas said. “This would be invaluable knowledge to bring back and apply in Lithuania.”

At Colgate, Arnoldas is majoring in international relations and has written an honors thesis: “Is Joining NATO in the national interest of Lithuania?” He is host of The World Matters, a weekly program on Colgate’s tv station that he originated after Sept. 11. He has written over 250 bylined articles for national Lithuania newspapers & weekly US papers, served as an intern for U.S. Sen. Richard Durbin, D-Ill., interned at Radio Liberty / Free Europe in Washington, D.C.

“Arnoldas is a treasure, almost literally shining with enthusiasm,” said Colgate’s interim president Jane Pinchin. “He uses language with precision and beauty. How lucky we are to have him here.”

What's Your Rotary I.Q.? - Sow the Seeds of Love by DGE Don Reese

"Rotary makes things possible, but Rotarians make things happen!" This is my personal theme for 2002-2003. Everything starts with the dedication of local club members and leaders who see a need in their community, their nation and their world and then try to fulfill that need! **Rotary's incoming President, Bhichai Rattakul firmly believes** Rotary's goals and objectives should be driven from the bottom up. He has pledged to not give individual clubs or districts goals they have to meet. Instead, since the strength of Rotary lies within the clubs and members, individual goals will be set.

What's your Rotary IQ? In this case, IQ does not refer to one's intelligence, but to your "Rotary Individual Quest". Right now, incoming Presidents are meeting with their Boards, Officers, Committee Chairs and Members to determine their own activities, goals and objectives for 2002-03. As part of the Planning Guide for Effective Rotary Clubs, incoming Presidents are working to achieve a consensus on areas such as Membership, Foundation Giving, Service Projects and Developing Rotary Leaders.

So...how many members will you bring in to Rotary this year? How much will you contribute to the "Eradicate Polio Campaign" and The Rotary Foundation Annual Giving Campaign? How will you help your club create effective service projects? Since leadership starts at the club levels, what can you do to help develop Rotary's future district leaders?

As a District, we are doing the same. Working with your Club Presidents, District Officers and Committee Chairs, we are also working to set flexible goals and objectives, based on the ones you give to us. This is really a "bottoms up" approach to management. Some of these goals may have to change because circumstances evolve over the course of a year. That is perfectly all right. We cannot be so rigid that we cannot accept change.

The 2002-2003 Presidential Citation is based entirely on the clubs' individual quest and accomplishments. How well you do depends entirely on you. From the District level, I will certainly support you in every way possible; just let me know how I can help!

To earn the Presidential Citation, clubs need to set and achieve your own membership goal. You also need to participate in or financially support a program or project of The Rotary Foundation. While not demanded, it is hoped that this will reflect a NEW program or project. Then, clubs need to initiate projects in each of the four avenues of service. Again, it is hoped that these be new ventures for the club, perhaps working with their local communities to identify critical needs for Community Service or working with the AGs to help determine a new International Avenue of Service. Your Rotary IQ will be your guide for this!

At the District Assembly on May 18, Clubs will be presenting their initial plans for 2002-2003. Rotary makes things possible, but Rotarians make things happen! When I make my Official Visit to your club and I ask you..."What is your Rotary IQ?"... how will you answer?? **Let's give Gov Bruce a great 01-02 send-off, and then get ready to Sow the Seeds of Love!**

The Search for District Governor 2005-06 by DG Bruce Frassinelli

The search is underway for District Governor for 2005-06, **the person who will succeed** District Governor-Nominee-Designate Jim Austin of the Tully Rotary Club.

Letters went out recently from District Governor-elect Don Reese to club presidents and presidents-elect urging them to consider nominations.

Nominations are to be sent on the official nomination form to District Governor Bruce Frassinelli, who will in his capacity of immediate past district governor in August, serve as chair of the nominating committee. Questions about nominations should be sent to DG Bruce at 139 Arcadia Avenue, Oswego, NY 13126, by e-mailing him at brucep@aiusa.com or by calling him at 315-342-4180.

The committee will meet August 23, 2002, at the DeWitt Community Library in the Shoppingtown Mall. **The deadline for nominations is Friday, August 16, 2002.**

Here are the **qualifications for district governor.** He or she:

- must be an active member in good standing with a club in the district.
- must have full qualifications for such membership, and the integrity of the Rotarian's classification must be without question.
- must be a member in a functioning club in good standing which has no outstanding indebtedness to Rotary International or to the district as of the close of the year preceding that in which the Rotarian is proposed as a candidate for nomination.
- must have served as club president for a full term.
- must demonstrate knowledge of the qualifications, duties and responsibilities of governor as prescribed in the bylaws and submit to Rotary International, through its general secretary, a signed statement that the Rotarian understands clearly such qualifications, duties and responsibilities.

Such statement shall also confirm that (1) Rotarian is qualified for the office of governor and willing and able to assume the duties and responsibilities of that office and able to perform them

faithfully and (2) unless specifically excused by his or her board, a governor at the time of taking office must have attended the International Assembly in Anaheim, Calif., for its full duration and been a member of one or more Rotary clubs for at least seven years.

Governors also should:

- Possess the esteem and confidence of their own clubs.
- Be of high business or professional standing, with executive ability, demonstrated in the conduct of their businesses and professions.
- Have their business or professional work so well organized that they can give the time necessary to carry out Rotary business.
- Be a person whose conduct and the conduct of his or her immediate family is above reproach.
- Have knowledge of Rotary, its purpose, object and bylaws and be a Rotarian of recognized loyalty to Rotary International.
- Be able to discuss any phase of Rotary in a convincing manner and be able to convey information articulately.

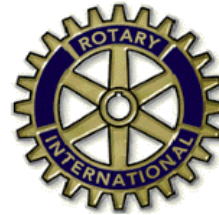
