Our Award Winning Web Sites: May '99 Update

The Technology Dream DG Ed envisioned for D7150 continues, as we continue to expand the site. We keep improving our service by connecting our Rotary members worldwide, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. We update information on both the District and the YE Rotary sites on an almost daily basis.

CONTINUED DRAMATIC INCREASES IN MONTHLY STATS: Let's take a look at who visited our web sites in April. Remember that a user is defined as a different person accessing the web site. That person may view 10 or more pages during their visit. Each time a separate page is viewed, it's called a hit.

In April, our Rotary District 7150 web site (www.rotarydistrict7150.org) had a total of 79,275 hits from 4,504 different users. The top 10 pages accessed and viewed were, in this order: the front index page, Breaking News, District Clubs, Links, GSE Sweden, Calendar, Directory, Fulton Charter, Guestbook, and DG Ed's page. In addition to our US viewers, the following 14 countries visited our District site in April: Australia, Netherlands, Canada, Sweden, the United Kingdom, Germany, Romania, Brazil, Mexico, Italy, Spain, Argentina, New Zealand, and Ireland. People once again found our District site by our weekly Rotary News Memo, plus a wide variety of search engines and various links.

In April, our Youth Exchange site (www.rotaryyouthexchange.org) had a total of 86,608 hits from 3,787 different users. The top 10 pages accessed and viewed were: the front index page, Message board, Late News, Chile, Inbounds, Outbounds, Brazil, YE countries, Fun News, and 1999-2000 Outbounds. The YE site also had some new countries visit in April. Besides our US viewers, the following 14 countries visited our YE site in March: Australia, Canada, Switzerland, Finland, Netherlands, Malaysia, Belgium, Mexico, United Kingdom, Japan, New Zealand, Poland, Germany, and Singapore. Again this month, people found our YE site by our weekly Rotary News Memo, plus a wide variety of search engines and various links.

NEW WEB SITE ADDITIONS: We've added several new features and pages to our already extensive sites. We've put pictures taken at the recent Inbounds weekend, up on the YE site. We also followed the journey of Chair Al Kalter and family down under in Australia. The Calendar stays updated with new events coming up for the YE folks.

Our District site has several new pages, including: pictures of the Paul Harris Foundation Dinner and award winners, pictures from the District Assembly, more "live" pictures from our GSE Team '99. The calendar has several items of interest, formatted so they can be printed off if desired. Among these are forms and maps for various events, including club activities, fund raisers, and CanCon'99 registration. Thanks to DG Ed & Barb, DGE Herb Jerry, DGN Ward Vuillemot, and to the various Club officers and committee members who contributed information for the calendar and club pages. The list of Rotarians who have submitted information or made requests that help us improve has grown too extensive to thank here, but they are mentioned in our weekly Rotary News Memo.

NEW FEATURE: We recently added a link on the front page to make it easy for Rotarians who visit our site to sign up for the Memo -- which includes District and International Breaking Rotary News of interest. If you're not on the list who receives this, either e-mail us or go to the front page of the District Site and sign up. As we go to print, we now have 21 of our 44 District Clubs up on the District site, each with a News Page and a President's Page. If your club isn't represented yet, send us the information and we'll get you up. We also have 95 percent of the members of our various Rotary Committees with their names formatted on the District Directory as clickable e-mails for ease in contacting them.

Dreaming for a Healthy Tomorrow Volunteers Needed For Prostate Cancer Study

Dr. Gabriel Haas, Chairman of the Urology Department, SUNY Health Science Center at Syracuse, has recently of the been awarded a research grant funded jointly by the department of Defense and the Department of Veterans Affairs to study risk factors that may contribute to the development of prostate cancer.

Prostate cancer is the most common form of malignancy in American men. Approximately 79,300 new cases and 37,000 deaths from prostate cancer are expected in 1999. It is generally believed that prostate cancer development depends on hormonal effects, particularly those of androgens and their metabolites. However, androgens may not be directly involved in the induction of prostate cancer. Rather, induction and progression of prostate cancer may be due to exposure to certain agents.

Several epidemiological surveys have suggested that intake of well-cooked meat and fried fish may be linked to prostate cancer. Well-cooked meats and cigarette smoke contain cancer-causing agents and these agents have been found in human urine. It is plausible that they may contribute to the development of prostate cancer. These agents are converted by the enzyme called N-acetyltransferase to reactive chemicals that can modify genes to cause cancer.

Dr. Haas will recruit 150 men diagnosed with prostate cancer and 450 men with no history of prostate cancer. All men will be asked to complete a 20-minute questionnaire outlining their health and dietary habits. A swab will be taken from the inside of the mouth and studied in the laboratory. The key questions that need to be addressed are 1) Is there a difference in the frequency of genetic subtypes of the enzyme N-acetyltransferase in the men with prostate cancer as compared to the general population and 2) is there an association between the cancer and exposure to carcinogenic amines and tobacco use.

This important study is voluntary and confidential. All males age 60 and over are urged to participate so that more information can be gained about prostate cancer. Anyone interested in participating may call Dr. Haas's nurse, Kathryn Spinek, at 464-6180.
