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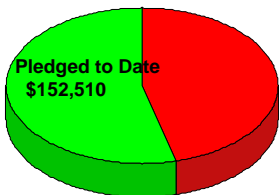

**Polio Campaign
District Goal \$300,000**



As all Rotarians know, **the Rotary Year begins on July 1 and ends on June 30.**

In those 365 days, Rotary International and every one of over 30,000 clubs tries to accomplish a wide variety of projects and programs, ranging from the smallest event in your community to the large, global movements such as Polio Eradication. In order to focus on all of the diverse areas of Rotary service, **RI breaks the year down by months**, with a major emphasis during each one.

In July, the focus is on Literacy. With every club experiencing new leadership, this month provides an opportunity for clubs and Districts to focus on the major emphasis of Literacy. In July, clubs will spend time developing plans for the rest of the 11 months to assist literacy efforts locally as well as nationally and abroad.

In August, we take a close look at Membership and Extension. Unfortunately, if you check the membership figures at the back of CREDO, you will see that our District is almost at the 1600 member level. This is quite a drop.

While I realize that clubs are adding new members, we also have to take time to focus on retention of members as well. We also have two Provisional Clubs that will soon be applying for their Charters... a great accomplishment during any year.

September is New Generations Month. With "back to school time",

this is indeed, very appropriate. Take a look in your community... can we get an Interact started? How about an Earlyact? Now is the time to talk with your local schools and see if a club can be started.

October is Vocational Service Month. When Paul Harris founded Rotary, he believed that such an organization could and would have a very positive effect on the work ethic. Indeed...as stated in a number of Rotary publications, "Since 1905, the ideas of Paul Harris and his friends have become ideals ... The general objectives of Rotary Clubs in every country are the same - the development of fellowship and understanding among business and professional leaders in the community".

This is where we have a **great opportunity to Sow the Seeds of Love.** Take the time to recognize the contributions of your fellow workers. Talk to them about why they are working in this particular profession. What types of satisfactions do they have from doing "an honest day's work". Then, as a Rotary Club, honor the workers of your community. Pride of Work Award (s) is a great way to start.

But, don't stop there. Be creative... look around your communities and find those folks who *really* make a difference on their job. Find out *why* they do what they do... what are their satisfactions! What a great way to honor America!

You & Your Club Can Make A Difference by PDG Bruce Frassinelli

All clubs in District 7150 are invited to participate in the Make A Difference Day effort this year. Make A Difference Day is **Saturday, October 26, 2002**. We would like to have every Rotarian in the district do a "good deed" for his or her community for the day -- preferably in collaboration with other similar-minded club members as a club-sponsored project. If clubs do not organize an event formally, individual Rotarians can do projects. Projects should be framed in a one-day time period (usually 3-4 hrs). Projects should not be ongoing or open-ended. You are encouraged to make a difference on Oct. 26, but the projects can be done near that date, taking into

consideration sensitivities about the sabbath of some religions.

Nearly 500 Dist 7150 Rotarians participated in last year's Make A Difference Day. The effort was publicized in a full-page feature story in the most recent (Aug. 2002) edition of The Rotarian magazine, and the district was one of the national regional winners selected by USA Weekend, national sponsor for Make A Difference Day.

Look around your community and identify a cause that needs attention. Then tackle it as a club.

The Rotary Leadership Institute offers a leadership development program in three full day sessions (Parts I, II and III). The courses are designed to provide Rotary knowledge and to develop leadership skills for voluntary organizations.

Bipartisan Congressional support for polio eradication buoys Rotary Rotary leaders are encouraged by continuing bipartisan Congressional support for polio eradication activities. In the Senate, the Labor/Health/Human Services Appro Subcommittee has recommended increasing the level of spending for polio eradication through the Centers for Disease Control & Prevention for the next fiscal year by \$4 million, for a total of \$106.4 million. The Senate Foreign Operations Appropriations Subcommittee suggested raising the amount for polio eradication to be spent by the U.S. Agency for Int'l Development (USAID) by \$2.5 million, for a total of \$30 million. - **R. I. President Bhichai Rattakul coming to D7150!**

Tech Tips on Reboots, Cap Locks, & New Machines by Marlene B. Brown, DICO



If you should have to make a change in Windows and **have to restart your system**, you can speed it up by rebooting

just Windows. Simply reboot the standard way (Start>>Shut Down>>Restart). But as you do so, depress the Shift key. This reboots Windows, not the computer.

Ever accidentally hit the Caps Lock key and found you're typing everything in upper case? It's can be irritating if you don't realize it. You can avoid this by **adding sound to the Caps Lock key**. Go into Control Panel and double click Accessibility

Options. Select the Keyboard tab. Check Use ToggleKeys. Click OK. This also sets sounds for Num Lock and Scroll Lock.

Want a desktop computer for only \$1,000 or so? Prices won't fall much in Q1 as manufacturers are holding down inventory. **Where to save? Chips:** The slowest chip selling today is Intel's 1.8 gigahertz Celeron. Consider a more capable Intel Pentium 4 that goes up to 2.8 GHz in speed. **Memory:** DDR SDRAM is new, fast & relatively cheap. Get at least 256 megabytes. Regards the hard drive: A 40-gigabyte drive will be cheap.

To **speed** up your system, get a drive that runs at 7200 RPM, instead of 5400. Your machine should include USB 2.0 ports, placed on the front for convenience. Since you're going to be spending a lot of time staring at the **monitor**, consider flat panels if you can.

Invest in a **broadband Internet** connection, if available. They're much faster than a 56k modem.

Check prices on line, then **buy at a local retailer** who's more accessible if you have problems. Getting things fixed is often easier face-to-face with the repair person. And keep Anti-Virus programs updated!

CAP Application Deadline Approaching by *Helen Shaffer (CAP) Chair*

The deadline for Community Assistance Program (CAP) application is 01 December 2002. Please get your applications in as soon as possible, so that they can be reviewed and any necessary adjustments can be made in an adequate time frame.

This is a rare opportunity for your club to *get Rotary Foundation dollars and put them in use in your community.* This may

possibly be the last year for the CAP program.

CAP will provide funding for one time only community service projects the involve participation from Rotarians. The projects must enhance the Community and/or improve the lives of disadvantaged people. The project must be Rotary sponsored, identified as a Rotary Project and completed within one year.

In September a Rotary Foundation letter and application forms were

sent to Club Presidents and Club Foundation Chairs. *The application can also be downloaded* on our District website's Foundation page. rotarydistrict7150.org/foundation.html.

Since 50% of this money comes back to D3500, we need to meet our goal for 2002-2003 of \$68,000. Need some help? Clubs are moving ahead with their **Membership Goals**. Under the guidance of **District Chair Dennis Schonewetter** we have held a series of membership seminars around the district. As usual, some clubs are doing well, while others are working through some club related issues. The important thing is for clubs to meet the membership goals that they set, not RI.

National Make a Difference Day is moving ahead very quickly and will be here before you know it. October 26...Make a difference in your community. Through **District Chair, PDG Bruce Frassinelli**, please let me know how you are planning to "make a difference". If possible, I would like to participate in several projects across the district. District Polio Eradication Campaign Incentive Program *by PDG Ed Paparella*

This is a critical time for Rotary. Polio is close to being eliminated from the Earth, but the commodities of time & money are in short supply. *We have to make a commitment now*, to finish the task Rotary undertook in the mid-80's, and fulfill the promise made, to eradicate polio from the globe.

In keeping with this commitment our District has committed to a **grant fund of \$7,000** as incentive to clubs to reach their polio eradication fund-raising goals. **The first fourteen clubs** in our District with the highest per capita participation (a minimum of \$225.00 per

member goal for the 3-year program) **will receive a \$500 District Matching Grant.** The qualifying clubs will receive Polio credit for the grant, that's one half of a Paul Harris Fellow! The \$500 can be designated to whomever the club chooses, to more than one individual if desired. All clubs are eligible, and in this case, **size doesn't matter...but dollars do.**

If your club has already set your Polio Eradication Fund-raising Goal and it's under the \$225.00 minimum per member, this grant could be the incentive needed to increase the commitment level. If your club hasn't set its goal, take this into consider-

ation when doing so. Please inform the Polio Area Coordinator for your Club asap that you qualify for the incentive.

This is also a great opportunity for your Club to honor member(s) at the November 12th event in Rome with RI President Bhichai Rattakul making Paul Harris Fellow presentations. As you know a Polio Paul Harris Fellow Commemorative Certificate is being issued to new PHF recipients. **This DistrictWide Incentive Program** will conclude when the first 14 clubs are confirmed by the Polio Eradication Committee or 12/31/02 whichever comes first. **Thank you** for supporting this global effort to Eradicate Polio.
