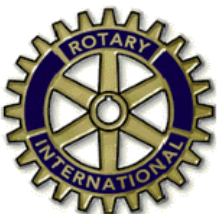

"Service Above Self"

One-quarter of the 2001-02

Rotary year is over. It's a great time to take stock, to see where we stand vs. our goals.

I established a group of 10 key goals for this year. At the top of the list are **membership** and The **Rotary Foundation**. We also have ambitious plans to add three **new clubs**, form new **Earlyact** and **Interact** clubs and involve all Rotarians in a series of **community service projects** in conjunction with National Make A Difference Day.

This also is a perfect time for club presidents and their leadership teams to measure where they are in relationship to achieving their goals.

The **Rotary Global Quest** asks us to have at least three new members by this point -- one a month -- as we aim at a net gain of five by the end of the Rotary year.

Our district membership numbers as of Aug. 31, the last month for which official figures are available, indicate that we have lost about 20 members from our July 1 starting point, but that is no reason to panic, because clubs frequently remove members from their rolls who have not lived up to their Rotary commitments. But now is the time to put the pedal to the metal. If we are to achieve our goal to add 220 members to our district's rolls, we will need every Rotarian to commit to bringing a prospective member to a meeting. Remember, it has got to

begin with You: **Let It Begin with Me**. As I told you during my official club visits, the buck stops with you: **"If it is to be, it is up to me."**

We realized our goal to induct a new member, Caroline Prospect, into the Skaneateles Rotary Club at the recently completed District Conference in Saratoga.

The Rotary Foundation has received about \$10,000 in donations so far this year as we move toward **our goal of \$65,000**. We also achieved our goal to recognize a **Paul Harris Fellow** at the District Conference. I was delighted to be able to surprise completely my wife, Marie, to thank her in this unique way for her invaluable help during this special, once-in-a-lifetime experience.

Also at District Conference, we unveiled the mechanics of the **Make A Difference Day effort** when our 1,600 District 7150 Rotarians will be involved in a day-long community service project in their communities. This will represent the equivalent of one person working every second of every minute of every hour of every day of every month for an entire year -- **doing community service and serving mankind**. I am asking club presidents or this project's chair to inform me of what your club is doing on **Saturday, Oct. 27** -- Make A Difference Day. Please advise me of your project since I am making a **con't on page 2**

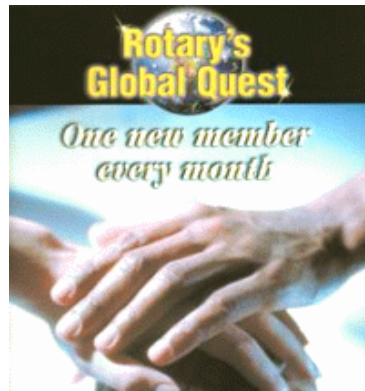
We are well on our way to achieving our goal of having three new clubs in the district by June 30. We have had two expansion meetings, and more are in the works as we have identified five potential geographic areas for new clubs.

Our **Gift of Vision** program has been embraced enthusiastically by clubs in the district. Our first Gift of Vision child -- from West Africa -- will be here next month. Thanks to the inspired leadership of chair Jim Gascon and co-chair Mike Occhipinti, this program has been expanded from a single-club project (Eastwood) to *a districtwide effort*.

We solidified our relationship with District 3820 of the Philippines with a \$7,000 **matching grant program** to help farmers in a poor region of that district become self-sufficient. And weren't the members of the **Group Study Exchange team from the Phillipines delightful!** Marie and I are so happy to call

Pedro ``Pete" Cootauco, the team leader and the four team members our friends. Their being here at this critical time in our nation's history was so meaningful and important.

We enjoyed our last supper with them on Oct.5, but our tearful good-byes the following day as they boarded their flight for the long trip home reminded us of how fleeting time is. We hope to see them again, either here or when I travel to the Philippines in the next year.



I am asking all **club presidents** to take stock of where they stand in achieving their **2001-02 goals**. For those of

you who are on track, congratulations, and keep up the good work. For those of you who have fallen behind, it is time for you and your leadership team to assess how to catch up.

Achieving our Rotary Global Quest goals is so imperative and so urgent, *nothing less than the future of our wonderful organization is at stake*.

Won't you please do your part?

Any Rotarians who **brings in three or more new members** this Rotary year qualifies for a specially struck pin from Rotary International. I will be honored and pleased to present this pin personally at an upcoming club meeting to any qualifying Rotarian.

I am also happy to report that I have brought in a Rotarian to my home Oswego Rotary Club and I have a second in the wings. My goal is to bring in three new Rotarians during this Rotary year. I am asking you to bring in one. If we do our part, we will hit our Rotary Global Quest goal and then some.

Oneida Shores Club Project for Afghans

Oneida Shores Rotarian Larry Linder, who served in the Peace Corps in Afghanistan 30 years ago, has been *moved by the plight of fleeing Afghans civilians* who are facing the severe Afghan and Pakistani winter without proper clothing.

He has written to Abdul Ahad Khan, president of the

Rotary Club of Queta, located along the refugee route in Baluchistan, asking whether Rotarians in the Oneida Shores and surrounding clubs can help.

Khan suggests **clubs may like to contribute for warm clothing** both for children and women. ``Our club members (26) will take the responsibility

for proper distribution among the poorer of the refugees," Khan writes to Linder. ``As you are well aware of the fact that winter's four months are quite cold in Baluchistan," he adds.

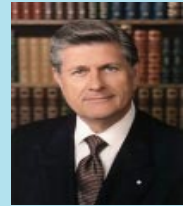

Majiyagbe, of the Rotary Club of Kano, Nigeria, is the choice of the RI Nominating Committee to be president of Rotary International in 2003-04 and the first African selected to be RI's top leader. He and his wife, Ade, are major donors to The Rotary Foundation. Majiyagbe, a senior advocate of Nigeria, is the principal counsel of a law firm in Kano. A member of the Nigerian and English bar, he is also a member of the Honourable Body of Benchers, a group charged with evaluating the qualifications of those seeking to practice law in Nigeria. Majiyagbe is a graduate of London University and a member of the Chartered Institute of Arbitrators, London. Majiyagbe has long been a leader in civic and charitable organizations in Nigeria.

He currently serves as chairman of the Nigerian Red Cross Society, as a member of the Kano Chamber of Commerce, Industry Mines and Agriculture, and as trustee of various international cultural organizations. A Rotarian since 1967, Majiyagbe has served RI as district governor, International Assembly instructor, chairman, director, and trustee of The Rotary Foundation. He currently chairs the African Regional PolioPlus Committee and the African Affairs Committee.

Have You Ever Hugged An Empty Space? by DGND Jim Austin

Recently at the District conference in Saratoga I had a little fun with Pedro, the GSE team leader from the Philippines. I had him come up and as I offered to shake hands with him, I pulled my hand away, so his hand shook emptiness. I started to give him a hug and ducked out of the way so **he was left hugging an empty space**. At the time it seemed like a harmless illustration but in his expression I could see concern so we completed the shake and hug.

But that will be a real concern if we do not have *a GSE team we can take to the Philippines in February*. We are allowing fear and rumors to dictate our actions when as Rotarians we need to be moving forward embracing this distraught world with hope and peace. It is understandable that worry of traveling, worry of world conflict and worry for our safety have become issues. Rotarians have opportunities today that few others do. Rotary is the largest service organization in the world, sending ambassadorial & peace/conflict management scholars into foreign countries. It is one of the most highly regarded and widely focused student exchange programs worldwide. We are one of the only volunteer based organizations that exchanges study teams.

GSE benefits we will jeopardize if we do not send a return team:

1) Last year 37 matching grants totaling almost \$200,000 were GSE team based.

2) Last year one of our returning GSE team members became a new Rotarian, saying: "The GSE " has jump-started [my] need to be part of a greater world, to strive for positive changes. One of those changes has been to join

Rotary International. I hope to continue my involvement locally and internationally with a group that makes so many contributions to humanity." TM Susan Khan, D7150 (NY, USA) to D1050 (England)

3) Development of quality team members that bring quality back to their businesses. Here is a statement from just one GSE team leader: "The young curate is now chaplain to a bishop, the police inspector is assistant chief constable, the solicitor is a full partner in his law firm, the bank manager is a regional manager, the architect's practice is thriving. They say GSE had a deep influence on their lives." — Probate officer/GSE team leader

4) "GSE provides a great public relations opportunity to expand community awareness of your organization. Inform the local news media that one of your employees will be traveling to another country to learn extensively about its institutions, culture and The GSE program is an excellent opportunity for your organization to develop and recognize your top-performing young staff members for the global environment in which they will be working." (Pg 2, 304EN, GSE Dev)

So what can you do? You can't go because I have already been honored with that position but you can and should be recruiting. It is difficult for me to believe that somewhere in your community, schools, local business and agencies there is not one person between the ages of 25 and 40 that would like to have a free trip to the Philippines in the month of February. **Think about just one person your club can sponsor.** Ray Allen or myself will be willing to get you applications and work with you to help you determine possible candi-

dates for the outbound team. **The committee hopes to interview candidates this month.** But they can't interview if no one applies.

I want you to reach out right now and hug some air. How fulfilling was that? Now ask yourself, "How fulfilled will our District be and what statement are we making about our area and the United States to the Philippines if we can't even find four people to complete our GSE exchange?" When speaking to Pedro he said, "Jim, I hope you will find people for your team that are tolerant."

I thought, "Hey we're Americans. We're known for our tolerance. But then I was silenced in my heart when I realized maybe we aren't as tolerant as I thought. Maybe we've become too busy, too fearful, too worried, too tired, too lethargic to accept their open arms of hospitality. Maybe we no longer feel **the need to learn from our brother and sister Rotarians**, businesses, and the peoples of another country. I hope that's not the case.

I believe we are a tolerant people and can never stop learning. If there was ever a time in the history of our nation that Rotary can have one of its greatest impacts worldwide it is now. Whether wars are fought for political or holy concerns, Rotary International can still stand for peace. If we stay at home and do not continue to go out into the world, then peace will be lost piece by piece. ***If we move forward and continue to study and learn from each other***, then the hope of peace, which we embrace, will continue to shine and spread into the world.

This team of professionals will be lead by Rotarian Jim Austin of Tully Rotary Club and hosted by Rotarians from District 3820 in Rotarian homes. 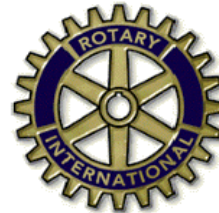
