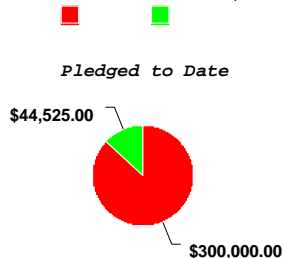

Polio Campaign District Goal \$300,000



As you know, the Fall of the year is just spectacular in this part of the U.S. Why not plan to spend *a relaxing and informative week-end in New England at the annual Rotary District 7150 Conference, October 18-20, 2002, Sturbridge, Massachusetts.* As of the printing of CREDO, we still have about ten rooms available in the main hotel, but many rooms in the immediate "neighborhood".

You Can Make A Difference & Annual Giving Goal *by PDG's Frassinelli & Vuillemot*

All clubs in District 7150 are invited to participate in the Make A Difference Day effort this year.

Make A Difference Day is **Saturday, October 26, 2002**. We would like to have every Rotarian in the district do a "good deed" for his or her community for the day -- preferably in collaboration with other similar-minded club members as a club-sponsored project. If clubs do not organize an event formally, individual Rotarians can do projects. Projects should be framed in a 1-day time period (usually 3-4 hrs). Projects should not be on-going or open-ended. You are encouraged to make a difference on Oct. 26, but the projects can be done near that date, taking into consideration sensitivities about the sabbath of some religions.

Nearly 500 Dist 7150 Rotarians participated in last year's Make A Difference Day. The effort was publicized in a full-page feature story in the most recent (Aug. 2002) edition of The Rotarian magazine, and the district was one of the national regional winners selected by USA Weekend, national sponsor for Make A Difference Day.

Look around your community and identify a cause that needs

attention. Then go tackle it as a club. Get ideas at makeadifferenceday.com. Register at inkindex.com for free project supplies, including Avery office projects. See how your project can honor victims of 9-11 attacks.

To achieve our goal and fulfill our promise to eradicate polio by the year 2005, we must raise US\$80 million; otherwise, 20 years of progress may be lost. I also invite Rotarians to begin preparations for Rotary's milestone centennial in 2005 by implementing a *Rotary Club Centennial Community Project* that will serve as a lasting reminder of Rotary's contributions and mission of service. * **On 9 September**, the RI Nominating Committee selected *Glenn E. Estess Sr.*, of the Rotary Club of Shades Valley, Alabama, USA, as *president of Rotary International in 2004-05*. Estess will lead the RI Convention in 2005, when Rotary celebrates its centennial. He will become the official nominee 1 Dec.

In 2002, clubs and districts are asked to form their own centennial planning committees to plan and launch observances and projects.

nity, and provides a permanent identification of the sponsoring Rotary club.

Clubs are asked to **register their Centennial projects with R.I. by January 2003**. All projects must be completed by February 2005.

The Cure for Problems Viewing Websites by Marlene B. Brown, DICO



Most problems you may experience when viewing websites will be resolved by installing one of the newer

browsers. You can download a newer version at Browsers.com You need to have a frames capable browser to view some websites. If you have a newer browser and you are still having trouble, try refreshing the page. If this doesn't help try restarting your machine and/or re-installing your browser. If you have a 3.0 or newer browser installed and certain functions of the site don't work, make sure you

have your browser options set correctly.

In Netscape select Edit Preferences to open the options dialog. Make sure that you have Java, JavaScript, and Accept Cookies enabled, Auto Load Images selected, and Style Sheets turned on. In Internet Explorer select View Internet Options. Make sure that Show Pictures is selected and that your security level is set to Medium. This will allow the use of Java, JavaScript, VBScript, and Active X, but will still warn you of potentially dangerous

content. If you have an Advanced tab (version 4.0), select Show Images, Accept Cookies, and Java VM.

Web security has been a hot topic of late. Contrary to popular belief, Cookies are not a security threat. They are most often used to store information on the users computer for their own convenience. Avoid providing sensitive information (such as credit card numbers) outside of a secure server page. (Your browser should notify you when you are entering or leaving a secure page.)

District Leadership Steps Up for Polio, \$14,150 Pledged by PDG Ed Paparella

At the Past District Governor/Leadership Council and spouse social gathering in Rome on Sunday August 25th, the group in consensus agreed to "walk the talk" in the Polio Eradication Campaign giving here in our District. Thank you one & all.

Many of our PDG's & others were involved in the original Polio Campaign back in the middle 80's. A video viewed at the gathering coordinated by PDG Mike Occhipinti brought back memories for many. Mike took a leadership role back in the 80's and is doing so again today along with many in our District. It was a time of reflection covering the early years in our Rotary battle to Eradicate Polio up to the present. A moving and motivating presentation that brought tears and pride in what can be accomplished with the involvement of every Rotarian in the World.

The Leadership in attendance and those not able to be present, understanding the importance and need have pledged \$14,150 to the Polio

Eradication Campaign effort. All pledges will be processed through the Clubs. An awesome response, that hopefully will encourage every Rotarian in our District to also respond to the best of their ability. **Our District Goal is \$300,000.** We are asking every Rotarian to consider **a pledge of \$75.00 a year for 3 years. Putting that into perspective is \$1.45 a week.** In view of the need and worldwide Rotary commitment, an amount within reach. Clubs are also being asked to consider Community fundraising & Corporate donations to help achieve Club goals.

Effective Rotary Clubs by DG Don Reese



As you know, District 7150 has 45 Rotary Clubs. Each and every one of these clubs plays a very vital role in their community as well as around the world. **Service Above Self** is not only our motto, but are the very words we live by as Rotarians. Through the District Governor and the Assistant Governors, Rotary International also looks at clubs to ascertain their effectiveness in meeting the guidelines and procedures of Rotary itself. In February of 1999, the Rotary Int'l Board actually adopted a definition of an effective Rotary Club. **There are four elements which make up an "effective club":**

1. **Effective Clubs are able to sustain and grow their membership base.** Needless to say, this is a critical element of success for a club. We absolutely need to keep our members active and involved and we need to infuse new blood as often as we can. More hands do make the work lighter! From our multiple service backgrounds, we all know that it takes a lot more effort to recruit new "customers" than it does to maintain the ones we have. The same is true of Rotarians. Sustaining membership should be one of the key goals for all of us. I do not believe that all of this is just a "numbers" game. In fact, our RI President, Bhichai Rattakul has stated that we need a "quality" of membership, not necessarily a large quantity of members. Quality does not mean that we are an elitist group (if that was the case I never would have been admitted to Rotary!!), but rather a strong core of members who want to give to their community, nation and the world. It is **Service**, not necessarily status that

is important here.

2. **Effective Rotary Clubs Implement Successful Projects that address the needs of their communities and communities in other countries.** Our District Clubs are **extremely** active in service projects. Like a lot of us, I have had the opportunity to travel, both overseas and in the US. While traveling I will often stop for lunch or dinner at a local Rotary Club. Many times, clubs have one or two projects as focus elements, but then mostly ignore other ventures. I am proud to say... not in this District! Our service projects are as diverse as our clubs. From District to Area to Club projects, we stand heads above the rest of the Rotary world.

3. **Effective Rotary Clubs support the Rotary Foundation through both program participation and financial contributions.** This year, we have really intensified the war against polio. Through the Eradicate Polio Campaign of RI, headed locally by PDG Ed Paparella (GUS Rotary) and his team of area coordinators, our goal is \$300,000 to be raised this year (paid between 2002-2005) as part of the overall campaign of \$80,000,000 for RI worldwide. In addition, we still have the Annual Giving goal of \$68,000 for our district for 2002-2003. Jerry Gortner (Rotary Club of Canastota) is our District Foundation Chair for this year. His team is actively planning an informative seminar for the Foundation, to be held on November 9, 2002 at the Rusty Rail in Canastota. In addition to these efforts, we will have a Group Study Exchange team from Taiwan (District 3500) with us in late September to late October. Our team will travel to Taiwan, R.O.C. next Spring. Of course, we help to sponsor the Rotary Peace Scholarships, Ambas-

sadorial Scholars and a wide variety of grant funded programs. For more information on any of these, please contact Chair Jerry Gortner.

4. **Effective Rotary Clubs develop leaders capable of serving in Rotary beyond the club level.** "Rotary makes it possible, but Rotarians make it happen"! As you know, this is my personal theme for 2002-2003. We need a number of our "quality" Rotarians to take an active role in the District Leadership. Believe me, there are many opportunities to do so! Not everyone wants to be District Governor, not to chair a District Committee, but, take a look in the Directory and see the number of committees we have available where we do need volunteers. I am pleased to report that just about everyone I asked to assist us this year did so with a cheerful... **Yes!** Past Club Presidents... your leadership is needed within the District. If anyone is interested in serving on any of our District Committees, please let me or your Assistant Governor know. We can certainly get you involved! And, we need the clubs to encourage.. motivate.. and recommend Rotarians aswell.

New Generations by District Governor Don Reese

As you can tell from the title, **September is "New Generations Month"** in the world of Rotary. Why new Generations? Well, unfortunately folks, we are all getting older. Someday, hopefully not for a long time, some of us might not be able to carry out the goals and objectives of Rotary. So, *we need to train, nurture, mentor, instruct and help to develop the youth of our area* to carry our banners forth! In addition, our younger folks tend to develop new and even better ideas as to how to carry the message of Rotary throughout our Communities, Nation and the World.

In District 7150, **our New Generations Committee** (consisting of Earlyact, Interact, Rotaract and RYLA) is headed by Dave Kennedy of the Rotary Club of Fayetteville-Manlius. He is also the chair for Interact. Don St. Louis of Utica chairs the Earlyact area, John Pawloski of the Greater Utica Sunrise Club heads Rotaract and Ray Allen of Oriskany-Whitestown is our

RYLA Chair.

Basically, **all of these groups, aimed at various ages of our youth**, are organized to help prepare students and young adults to be better citizens, to develop leadership skills and to promote international understanding and peace. We currently have ten active Earlyact clubs in the district, seven Interact clubs, a very active RYLA organization, but, no Rotaract clubs.

Our Chair, John Pawloski, is determined to have at least one Rotaract Club chartered this year. Rotaract Clubs work under the guidance of their local Rotary Club, and take their name from a combination of the terms Rotary and Action. They are designed for men and women aged 18-30. In fact, a number of our past GSE team members have been recruited from their local Rotaract Clubs. In many ways, the club acts like their parent Rotary Clubs. They meet on a regular basis, have officers, feature programs and speakers at meetings, and visit other clubs. John is currently looking at several

areas and sites to form such a club. While usually associated with a college, the group can also be organized through a Neighborhood Youth Center or other similar civic minded group. Interact (high school) and Earlyact (elementary) clubs work in the same way.

Our latest Interact club was chartered at Oswego High School earlier this year, during PDG Bruce's year. Eight of our Earlyact clubs are located in Rome. The clubs are run by the young club members, they also often undertake school or community related projects. They can certainly help out on National Make A Difference Day!

What does it take to get started? Simply put... interested Rotarians! What a great Community Service project and what a great way to fulfill that part of the Presidential Citation for Outstanding Clubs, 2002-2003. **If you are interested in finding out more about these clubs, please contact the respective Chairs or your Assistant Governor.** This is a great way to "Sow the Seeds of Love"!

Rotary Foundation Matching Grants by District Chair PDG Ned Mann

Does your club want to initiate a World Community Service Project? It's easier than you think but patience is required. **Here are some helpful hints** to get you started.

1. Get a copy from me or Evanston on the rules, qualifications and guide lines (RF2-141-EN-(895)-2M) Read it carefully.
2. Determine if your club will "go it alone" or yoke with other club(s) in your area.

3. Determine your financial limits for the project. Think in \$1,000 increments up to \$15,000
4. Look at the WCS web site for parenting candidates for your project (take a small project or a finite segment of a larger project).
5. Search your area for any specific equipment or donations (cash or in-kind)
6. Select your project
7. Check Evanston to see if your project is still "live" and not

being done by another club.

8. Register it in Evanston (they will assign a number)
 9. Contact the local Rotary Club in the project area. This is a must. They must accept you.
 10. Determine the responsibilities for each club.
 11. Use FAX or E-Mail to communicate.
