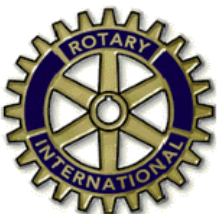

This year's District Conference at Saratoga Springs will offer terrific training, colorful keynoters, a quixotic quest through the Saratoga community as part of Scavenger Hunt 2001, and, Friday night after dinner, the shout of Toga, Toga, Toga will go up as the district conference's first-ever Toga Party takes place.

The conference schedule is posted at www.district7150.org/conference.html plus each conference registrant will receive the schedule prior to arriving in Saratoga. This will allow you to plan for this memorable weekend.

Ray Rigby of Idaho, President Rick King's representative, will give the *Saturday night keynoter address*. Rosemary Nesbitt of Oswego, one of the area's most noted historians and story-tellers, will be the *Friday night keynoter* who will speak about Volunteerism and the key of the individual in all that we do in Rotary.

The *annual business meeting* will be held at 3:30 p.m. Friday to choose the district governor for 2004-05 and to affirm the reappointment Anita Brown as our district secretary for a new three-year term. Our district's representative to the 2004 Council on Legislation. The Council of Governors has recommended that Past District Governor Joe McCarthy of the DeWitt Rotary

Club serve as the representative and Past District Governor Dave Peterson of the West Winfield Rotary Club be alternate. We also will act on several housekeeping matters to satisfy the Administrative Procedures Manual and hear the financial state of the district. There also will be other reports. *Presidential representative Ray Rigby* also will make his first appearance at the Friday afternoon session and make introductory remarks.

District Secretary Anita Brown has sent information to club leaders on how electors and proxies are certified to vote at District Conference. Be sure to read this information carefully and follow the directions set forth.

Friday night's dinner also will feature appearances by the leader and members of the *Group Study Exchange Team* from the Philippines, remarks by Kenneth Klotz, mayor of the city of Saratoga Springs, and John Quatrini, governor of District 7190, where Saratoga is located.

Our Parade of Nations, featuring our Youth Exchange students, also will be one of the highlights of the Friday program. It is always exciting seeing the pageantry of the entry of each of these young people representing countries from South America, Europe and Asia as their countries' national anthems are played.

The Friday night dinner will be followed by the first-ever **Toga Party** -- since we are in SaraTOGA. Prizes will be awarded for the most creative togas. Togas are optional. It'll be a fun event with lots of surprises.

One of the highlights of Saturday's program will be the annual **Literacy Committee project** -- a group, hands-on event, along with the donation of ethnic-specific books up to a third-grade level as part of the Bright Red Bookshelf Project we have been promoting for the last several months.

Saturday's plenary session will feature programs on National Make A Difference Day, Rotary Foundation, Vocational Service, Technology and an update on the new districtwide initiative, The Gift of Vision program by Jim Gascon of Eastwood Rotary.

We also will have a special program on Membership, an update on Rotary's Global Quest with Carolyn Pierce who will be representing Zone Membership Coord Chris Fraser.

There is a four-hour break -- from 1 to 5 p.m. Saturday. You

can book your own golf outing, visit a spa or merely wander the streets of Saratoga and visit the delightful shops and boutiques. The Historical Tour of Saratoga is completely booked and no additional seats are available.

Past District Governor Mike Occhipinti has arranged for a Mass at 5 p.m. Saturday at the Sheraton.

Saturday's district governor's dinner will feature club presi-



dents and past district governors processing to begin the program. President's Rep Ray Rigby's address will be the highlight of the dinner, which will be followed by a sing-along, karaoke and dancing.

Sunday's Memorial Service will be a tribute to deceased Rotarians of the past year. If any members of your club died

during the past year, please make Assistant Governor Jim Austin aware of their names. Jim will be in charge of the Memorial Service. You can call him at 696-8413 or email jaustin@twcny.rr.com.

The Sunday morning plenary session will feature District Governor Don Reese's look at Sturbridge, Mass., site of the 2002 district conference, and wrap-up remarks by Presidential Rep. Ray Rigby. The Group Study Exchange Team from the Philippines also will make a presentation. We also will have a dynamic presentation on Club Service by district chair Carol Anthony of the Chittenango Club.

Sunday morning is when the major door prize and all of the Scavenger Hunt prizes will be awarded. Remember, you must be present to win.

We will conclude the conference as we do traditionally every year -- holding hands and singing Let There Be Peace on Earth.

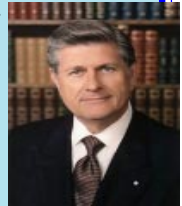

Techno Tips by Marlene B. Brown, Webmaster & District Internet Comm Officer



What do we have to worry about with viruses and worms?

➤ A virus is a program designed to invade a single computer and do something malevolent on that PC.

➤ A worm wreaks havoc on one computer also uses that computer to make more copies of itself, & send those clones on to other PCs.

➤ A Trojan horse gives others unauthorized access to your computer.

The worm *Red Code* attempts to infiltrate vulnerable computers, use them to replicate itself, and then cripple a Web site.

➤ If your computer is running one of the three existing Windows versions - 95, 98 or Millennium

Edition, or it's a Macintosh, your machine is immune to the worm.

➤ If you are using 2000 or NT on an individual machine, a home network, or on a larger business network, Code Red poses no threat unless the computer or network is also running Microsoft IIS software.

➤ Unlike most viruses & worms, *Code Red* lives only in a computer's Random Access Memory, which works only if the computer is on. Rebooting flushes the virus out. To close the hole get Microsoft's patch.

Other worrisome virus/worms:

➤ *W32/MTX@MM* is a combination Virus, Worm and Backdoor. As it has mailing capabilities users may receive an e-mail with a variable file attachment, like: zipped_files.exe

➤ *Virus Acid.A* propagates by infecting documents in Microsoft Word v.97 on Windows platforms.

➤ *W32/Badtrans* & *W32.Marijuana* are nondestructive mass mailing

worms. Clicking on their attachments will spread it to everyone listed in your Outlook address book. They sometimes come with an email "Check this out!"

➤ *W32/SirCam@mm* infects computers in a widespread manner. It can come from addresses you recognize, with an attached file that often says "Hi, how are you? I need your advice".

➤ *Win32.Invalid.A@mm* is a new Internet worm being sent in an email purporting to be from Microsoft Technical Support, often with a subject Invalid SSL & sslpatch.exe attachment

Remember to follow these guidelines:

- don't open attached email documents without knowing what they are
- make sure you have an updated anti-virus program on your machine
- scan your machine frequently
- save documents to pdf's or web
- back up all important documents

While we need to exercise caution, we should also enjoy the many benefits e-mail has brought to us all.

Make A Difference Day by District Governor Bruce Frassinelli

One of this year's new districtwide initiatives is to have every Rotarian in District 7150 participate in a day-long project as part of a **National Make A Difference Day** commitment.

Just imagine! Nearly 1,600 Rotarians giving about four hours of their time to help people on Saturday, October 27. That's about 6,400 hours of people power -- nearly 267 full days of action on behalf of our communities.

Ruth Anne Charlesworth, a spokesperson for the Nat'l Make A Difference Day organization, will

speak at the Dist Conf on Sept. 22 and lay out some things the 44 clubs in our district can do. Go to www.makeadifferenceday.com and you will find information about this national commitment, including a list of potential projects.

I have registered Rotary District 7150 as a participant, but *what we will need from each club is a brief description of the project* undertaken, the number of Rotarians who participated. Be sure to take pictures because we want to share them with other district Rotarians through the

Credo newsletter. We also will take the best photos to use for publicity in our district's newspapers and to submit to the Make A Difference organization.

We will distribute a brochure at the district conference to each club with specific information. National Make A Difference Day is sponsored by USA Weekend, the national weekend newspaper supplement, which appears in some area district newspapers.

Club presidents or designates are asked to *send a description of the project* your club will undertake or a description of the individual Rotarian projects being undertaken to DG Bruce

On the Road with DG Bruce and Marie by Bruce Frassinelli, DG, 2001-2002



Marie and I completed 23 of our official visits in July and another 18 in August, leaving just three to go in September.

We have already traveled more than 5,000 miles on Rotary-related business since July 1, and we expect to at least triple that by the end of the Rotary year.

Our August visits have taken us to the easternmost clubs -- Dolgeville and Little Falls; one of the most southern clubs -- Waterville; one of the most westernly clubs, Skaneateles, and the most northern club -- the easiest one to get to for us, my home club of Oswego.

What struck us was the majestic beauty of the area in which we call Central New York. From rolling farmlands to quaint villages, from small cities to sizable metropolises, the area is diverse and unique.

We were also struck by the friendliness of not only Rotarians but of others whom we have encountered on this glorious once-in-a-lifetime odyssey.

Regardless of whether we were seeking directions, killing some time in between visits or just exploring, the residents of our area have been helpful, friendly and courteous.

Rotarians themselves couldn't have been nicer. They have been so courteous to Marie and me. So many of the clubs made provisions for Marie to take tours or do other interesting things while the club leadership team and I handled business.

As I did last month, I would like to share some interesting observations we had during the past month:

Most sung patriotic song: "America" ("My Country 'tis to Thee"); second most sung: "America the Beautiful"

Most Past District Governors in the audience at one meeting: Three (at Rome and DeWitt)

Past District Governor in audience most often: Scott Creaser of Oriskany-Whitestown -- three times. (He's obviously a glutton for punishment or doing penance.)

Most unique display of Rotary membership pin: Morrisville

President Chris Klein, who had one in his ear at a Harley-Davidson meet. A biker from Bennington, Vt., who was fascinated by the pin, asked Chris what it was all about. After learning about Rotary's good works in the community and the world, the man ultimately became a member of the Bennington Rotary Club.

Soft-spoken award: To Earl Lewis, one of the newest members of the New Hartford Rotary Club who, along with Marlene Brown, club president, received a Rotary Commitment pin (the Regal Eagle) from me, for being honored for their work on our district website -- determined to be one of the best in the Rotary world -- at the Rotary International Conference in San Antonio in late June. Earl is a man of few words but of many actions as he goes about the job of proving that Mankind Is Our Business.

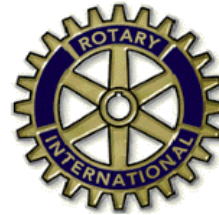
